RECOMMENDATION:

PREVIOUS ACTION:

The Investment Report for the quarter ended June 30, 2016, was filed with the City Clerk's Office on August 9, 2016, and presented to the City Council on August 17, 2016.

BACKGROUND:

From July 1, 2016 to September 30, 2016, the City of Escondido's (City)'s investment portfolio decreased from \$131.0 million to \$107.9 million. The adjusted average annual yield slightly decreased from 1.222 percent to 1.219 percent. An excess of cash payment outflows over cash receipt inflows for the quarter resulted in a decrease of \$23.1 million in the book value of the investment portfolio. Major components of the net \$23.1 million decrease are:

There are adequate funds to meet the next six month's expected expenditures. The Bank of New York Mellon Trust's monthly statement is the source for the market valuation. At September 30, the current portfolio investment balance exceeded the City's \$23.2 million current investment policy requirement by \$14.3 million. As of September 30, 2016, the City is in compliance with all requirements of the City Investment Policy.

Investment transactions are executed in compliance with the City of Escondido's Investment Policy. Investment purchases have been made in accordance with the City's prioritized Investment Policy objectives of safety of principal, sufficiency of liquidity, and maximization of yield. The City's investment portfolio has therefore historically been comprised of United States Treasury Notes, obligations issued by United States Government Agencies, FDIC Insured Certificates of Deposit, Money Market accounts, and investments in the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) established by the State Treasurer. Over the past five years, a decline in the City's average annual investment portfolio yield has been realized, decreasing from 2.05 percent at September 2011 to 1.22 percent at September 2016. This decline is representative of the continuous decline in investment interest rates and the portfolio's maturing, higher yielding investments being replaced with newer, lower yielding investments.

The Investment Committee will continue to monitor the City's portfolio trends and will investigate the feasibility of other allowable investment options that are consistent with the City's investment strategy and objectives. Additional information on these options and recommendations will continue to be communicated to the City Council by the Investment Committee.

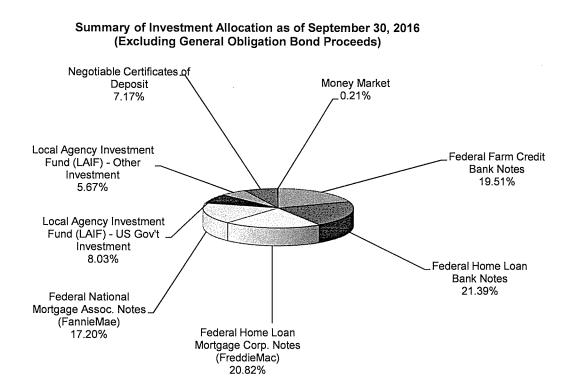

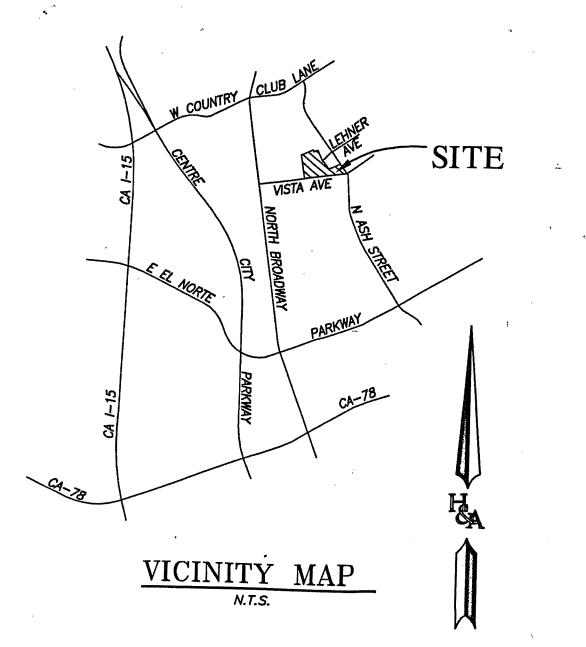
BACKGROUND:

RECOMMENDATION:

It is requested that the City Council approve budget adjustments totaling \$13,000 for playground rehabilitation projects, in conjunction with the award of Program Year (PY) 2014 Housing Related Parks (HRP) Program funds from the Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD).

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

Grant funds are recommended for repairs to playground equipment at Westside Park and Grove Park.

CORRELATION TO THE CITY COUNCIL ACTION PLAN:

This item relates to the City Council's Action Plan regarding Neighborhood Improvement.

PREVIOUS ACTION:

On January 14, 2015, the City Council authorized an application to HCD for PY 2014 HRP Program funds and the acceptance of grant funds if awarded, via Resolution No. 2015-16. On September 2, 2015, the City Council approved budget adjustments totaling \$685,450 for park improvement projects in conjunction with the award of PY 2014 HRP funds.

On February 3, 2016, the City Council authorized an application to HCD for PY 2015 HRP Program funds and the acceptance of grant funds if awarded, via Resolution No. 2016-14. On August 24, 2016, the City Council approved budget adjustments totaling \$161,600 for park improvement projects at Washington Park and Jim Stone Pool in conjunction with the award of PY 2015 HRP funds.

BACKGROUND:

The CA Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) administers the Housing-Related Parks (HRP) Program (Program) which was designed to encourage cities and counties to develop new

residential housing by rewarding those jurisdictions that approve housing affordable to lower-income households. The HRP Program was funded through Proposition 1C, the Housing and Emergency Shelter Trust Fund Act of 2006, Health and Safety Code Section 53545, subdivision (d) and originally established pursuant to Chapter 641, Statutes of 2008 (AB 2494, Caballero), at Chapter 8 of Part 2 of Division 31 of the Health and Safety Code (commencing with Section 50700) and subsequently amended pursuant to Chapter 779, Statutes 2012 (AB 1672, Torres).

On September 2, 2015, the City Council approved budget adjustments for park improvement projects at the Park Avenue Community Center, East Valley Community Center, Grape Day Park, Washington Park, Jim Stone Pool, and the Oak Hill Activity Center. Work has been completed at Park Avenue Community Center, East Valley Community Center, Grape Day Park, Washington Park, and Oak Hill Activity Center. Plans for Jim Stone Pool are under review and work is anticipated to begin in spring.

Recent playground inspections at Westside Park and Grove Park revealed necessary playground equipment repairs. Equipment is currently closed. Housing-Related Parks Grant funds can be used to expedite these repairs. Staff now suggests that \$13,000 in grant funds which have been reserved for Jim Stone Pool be used for playground repairs.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is requested that the City Council authorize the Engineering Department to accept the SoCal Water\$mart Rebate in the amount of \$68,975.02 and approve a budget adjustment for the LMD for \$116,475.00.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

The Rebate covers approximately 60 percent of the cost to purchase and install weather-smart irrigation controllers and water-efficient nozzles. The City will be using LMD Reserve funds to cover remaining costs.

BACKGROUND:

The City's current LMD irrigation controller system is manual. This rebate allows the City to purchase and install weather-smart controllers with a remote management system that is accessible by computer, tablet, or smartphone. The system also offers performance monitoring, problem identification, such as leaks and vandalism; email alerts and alarms for the management of exceptions to watering schedules, and reports on water usage. It also has the capacity to monitor prior day weather, sense temperature, and adjust watering accordingly.

This rebate will allow the City to install approximately 53 weather-smart irrigation controllers in 33 zones, operating 1,140 irrigation stations. The City will also replace approximately 2,698 irrigation heads with rotating nozzles, further enhancing water efficiency by an estimated twenty percent.

The City maintains six dumpster enclosures in the public parking lots located downtown. These provide trash and recycling containment for the businesses in that area. Each enclosure consists of four block walls and a metal gate. These enclosures have become increasingly subject to vandalism and vagrancy issues, resulting in increased police patrols and public works staff involvement.

The proposed project would use the funds to install a metal roof over the top of each enclosure and screen off the space on the sides between the new top and the block walls. These upgrades will provide a cleaner and safer enclosure for the businesses that use them and assist the Police Department staff by providing security improvements to mitigate the existing concerns.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

The City has applied for \$2,968,000 in ATP funds in the ATP Cycle 3 round. ATP awards consist of State and Federal funds. If SANDAG recommends either of the City of Escondido applications in the regional competition, SANDAG may choose to substitute TransNet funds for the State/Federal Funds.

CORRELATION TO THE CITY COUNCIL ACTION PLAN:

This item relates to the City Council's Action Plan regarding Neighborhood Improvement.

PREVIOUS ACTION:

On June 8, 2016, the City Council authorized the Public Works Director or his designee to complete applications to CalTrans and SANDAG for Active Transportation Program (ATP) Grant funds, accept the grant funds, and complete necessary grant documents.

BACKGROUND:

ATP was created by Senate Bill 99 and Assembly Bill 101 to encourage increased use of active modes of transportation. ATP goals include: increase biking and walking trips, increase the safety and mobility of non-motorized users, greenhouse gas reduction, enhance public health, and provide a broad spectrum of projects to benefit many types of active transportation.

After receiving authorization from the City Council, staff submitted two applications to Caltrans for ATP Cycle 3 grants for the Juniper Elementary Safe Routes to School Project (\$1,386,000) and an Escondido Creek Bicycle Path Improvement Project (\$1,632,000). Funds are awarded as part of a statewide competition or a regional competition. Neither of these projects have been selected for funding in the statewide competition. SANDAG, as the local Metropolitan Planning Organization, is conducting a competitive selection process for the Cycle 3 distribution of ATP funds in the San Diego Region. If a project is recommended for funding in the Regional Competition, SANDAG may choose to substitute local TransNet funds for State and Federal funds. The City Council is being asked to approve a resolution consistent with SANDAG Board Policy No. 035, to allow a TransNet/ATP swap, if applicable, in order to accept TransNet funds.

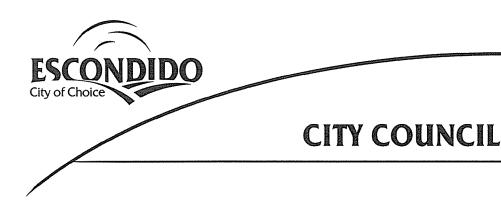

SUBJECT: Authorize a Municipal Billing Cost Reduction Service Contract

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2016-153, authorizing the Mayor and the City Clerk to execute a three-year Service Contract (Consulting Agreement) with Procure America to analyze existing billing rates charged to the City for copier, printer, and telecom services for potential renegotiation at more favorable rates.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

The project will be funded at no cost to the City. Procure America will evaluate vendors' billing rates for their services charged to the City to identify opportunities for restructuring contracts at more favorable rates.

DISCUSSION:

The City consistently seeks ways to reduce costs and improve efficiencies. Procure America contacted staff regarding their work with public agencies to review and analyze billing rates and contracts for services provided by vendors and providers. Staff conducted a search to evaluate other similar firms who provide the same service as a comparison and determined that Procure America provides the most comprehensive approach at the best rates.

The proposed contract includes an assessment of the City's copier and printer programs (hardware, service and supplies) and the City's telecom expenses (voice, data and mobile). Procure America's efforts includes raising vendor service levels, auditing deliverables, and enhancing supplier relations. A four-step process will be instituted involving 1) reviewing the City's contracts and reviewing line item expense categories; 2) identifying opportunities for adjusting needs and goals; 3) executing renegotiated contracts; and 4) auditing results. No payment for Procure America's services will be made if there are no savings realized through its efforts. The City and Procure America will evenly split any savings derived from this contract for a three-year period.

WHEREAS, the City of Escondido is interested in operating in a cost efficient manner; and

WHEREAS, Procure America analyzes existing municipal billing rates with the City's copier and printer programs (hardware, service and supplies) and the City's telecom expenses (voice, data and mobile); and

WHEREAS, the City Council anticipates a cost savings for renegotiated services and billing rates for the City's copier and printer programs, and telecom expenses based on Procure America's efforts; and

WHEREAS, the analysis will be conducted at no cost to the City; and

WHEREAS, renegotiated billing rate savings will be shared between the City and Procure America for a three-year period; and

WHEREAS, this City Council desires at this time and deems it to be in the best public interest to approve the Consulting Agreement ("Agreement") with Procure America.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Escondido, California, as follows:

1. That the above recitations are true.

2. That the City Council accepts the recommendation of the City Manager to enter into an Agreement with Procure America.

3. That the Mayor and City Clerk are authorized to execute, on behalf of the City, the Agreement with Procure America to analyze existing municipal billing rates with the City's copier and printer programs (hardware, service and supplies) and the City's telecom expenses (voice, data and mobile); and to evenly share the savings with Procure America for a three year period. Witness that whereas:

- A. It has been determined to be in the CITY's best interest to retain the professional services of a consultant to provide cost reduction services for the City's copier and printer programs (hardware, service and supplies) and the City's telecom expenses (voice, data and mobile); and
- B. The CONSULTANT is considered competent to perform the necessary professional services for CITY;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed by and between CITY and CONSULTANT as follows:

- 1. <u>Services</u>. The CONSULTANT will furnish all of the services as described in "Attachment A" which is attached and incorporated by this reference.
- 2. <u>Compensation</u>. The CITY will pay the CONSULTANT in accordance with the conditions specified in "Attachment A," Any breach of this Agreement will relieve CITY from the obligation to pay CONSULTANT, if CONSULTANT has not corrected the breach after CITY provides notice and a reasonable time to correct it (30 day cure period). If this Agreement is amended at any time, additional compensation of CONSULTANT contained in subsequent amendment(s) shall not exceed a cumulative total of twenty-five percent (25%) of the maximum payment provided for in this Section 2.

- 3. <u>Scope of Compensation</u>. The CONSULTANT will be compensated for performance of tasks specified in "Attachment A" only. No compensation will be provided for any other tasks without specific prior written consent from the CITY.
- 4. <u>Duties</u>. CONSULTANT will be responsible for the professional quality, technical accuracy, timely completion, and coordination of all reports and other services furnished by the CONSULTANT under this Agreement, except that the CONSULTANT will not be responsible for the accuracy of information supplied by the CITY.
- 5. <u>Personnel</u>. The performance of services under this Agreement by certain professionals is significant to the CITY. CONSULTANT will assign the persons listed on "Attachment B," which is attached and incorporated by this reference, to perform the Services described in Paragraph 1, and will not add or remove persons from the list without the prior written consent of the CITY. If no designation is made, then CONSULTANT may not assign services without obtaining the advance written consent of the CITY. CONSULTANT will not subcontract any tasks under this Agreement without obtaining the advance written consent of the CITY.
- 6. <u>Termination</u>. Either CONSULTANT or the CITY may terminate this Agreement with thirty (30) days advance written notice. If the CITY terminates this Agreement prior to the term expiring then CONSULTANT shall be compensated for services provided and accepted by the City at the time of termination.
- 7. <u>City Property</u>. All original documents, drawings, electronic media, and other material prepared by CONSULTANT under this Agreement immediately becomes the exclusive property of the CITY, and may not be used by CONSULTANT for any other purpose without prior written consent of the CITY.
- 8. Insurance.
 - a. The CONSULTANT shall secure and maintain at its own cost, for all operations, the following insurance coverage, unless reduced by the City Attorney:
 - (1) General liability insurance. Occurrence basis with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 each occurrence, \$2,000,000 General Aggregate, and \$1,000,000 Products/Completed Operations Aggregate; and
 - (2) Automobile liability insurance of \$1,000,000 combined single-limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage, unless waived as provided in 8(b) below; and
 - (3) Workers' compensation and employer's liability insurance as required by the California Labor Code, as amended, or certificate of sole proprietorship; and
 - (4) Errors and Omissions professional liability insurance with minimum coverage of \$1,000,000.
 - b. It is the parties' understanding that the use of a motor vehicle is not a primary subject of this Agreement. CONSULTANT acknowledges that operating a motor vehicle is outside the scope of this Agreement and occurs only at the convenience of the CONSULTANT. A waiver of automobile liability insurance is only effective if both sets of initials appear below, otherwise such insurance is required.

- c. Each insurance policy required above must be acceptable to the City Attorney.
 - (1) Each policy must provide for written notice within no more than thirty (30) days if cancellation or termination of the policy occurs. Insurance coverage must be provided by an A.M. Best's A- rated, class V carrier or better, admitted in California, or if non-admitted, a company that is not on the Department of Insurance list of unacceptable carriers.
 - (2) All non-admitted carriers will be required to provide a service of suit endorsement in addition to the additional insured endorsement.
 - (3) Both the General Liability and the Automobile Liability policies must name the CITY specifically as an additional insured under the policy on a separate endorsement page. The CITY includes its officials, employees, and volunteers. The endorsement must be ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 edition or its equivalent for General Liability endorsements and CA 20 01 for Automobile Liability endorsements.
 - (4) The General Liability policy must include coverage for bodily injury and property damage arising from CONSULTANT's work, including its on-going operations and products-completed operations hazard.
 - (5) The General Liability policy must be primary and noncontributory and any insurance maintained by CITY is excess.
- c. In executing this Agreement, CONSULTANT agrees to have completed insurance documents on file with the CITY within fourteen (14) days after the date of execution. Failure to comply with insurance requirements under this Agreement will be a material breach of this Agreement, resulting in immediate termination at CITY's option.
- 9. <u>Indemnification</u>. CONSULTANT (which in this paragraph 9 includes its agents, employees and subcontractors, if any) agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the CITY from all claims, lawsuits, damages, judgments, loss, liability, or expenses, including attorneys' fees, for any of the following:
 - a. Any claim of liability arising out of the negligence or any acts or omissions of CONSULTANT in the performance of this Agreement;
 - b. Any personal injuries, property damage or death that CONSULTANT may sustain while using CITY-controlled property or equipment, while participating in any activity sponsored by the CITY, or from any dangerous condition of property; or
 - c. Any injury or death which results or increases by any action taken to medically treat CONSULTANT.
- 10. <u>Anti-Assignment Clause</u>. The CONSULTANT may not assign, delegate or transfer any interest or duty under this Agreement without advance written approval of the CITY, and any attempt to do so will immediately render this entire Agreement null and void. Unless CONSULTANT assigns this entire Agreement, including all rights and duties herein, to a third party with the CITY'S written consent, CONSULTANT shall be the sole payee under this Agreement. Any and all payments made pursuant to the terms of this Agreement are otherwise not assignable.

- 11. <u>Costs and Attorney's Fees</u>. In the event that legal action is required to enforce the terms and conditions of this Agreement, the prevailing party will be entitled to reasonable attorneys' fees and costs.
- 12. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. CONSULTANT is an independent contractor and no agency or employment relationship, either express or implied, is created by the execution of this Agreement.
- 13. <u>Merger Clause</u>. This Agreement and its Attachments, if any, are the entire understanding of the parties, and there are no other terms or conditions, written or oral, controlling this matter. In the event of any conflict between the provisions of this Agreement and any of its Attachments, the provisions of this Agreement must prevail.
- 14. <u>Anti-Waiver Clause</u>. None of the provisions in this Agreement will be waived by CITY because of previous failure to insist upon strict performance, nor will any provision be waived by CITY because any other provision has been waived, in whole or in part.
- 15. <u>Severability</u>. The invalidity in whole or in part of any provision of this Agreement will not void or affect the validity of any other provisions of this Agreement.
- 16. <u>Choice of Law</u>. This Agreement is governed by the laws of the State of California. Venue for all actions arising from this Agreement must be exclusively in the state or federal courts located in San Diego County, California.
- 17. <u>Multiple Copies of Agreement/Counterparts</u>. Multiple copies and/or counterparts of this Agreement may be executed, including duplication by photocopy or by computerized scanning device. Each duplicate will be deemed an original with the same effect as if all the signatures were on the same instrument. However, the parties agree that the Agreement on file in the office of the Escondido City Clerk is the copy of the Agreement that shall take precedence should any differences exist among copies or counterparts of the document.
- 18. <u>Provisions Cumulative</u>. The foregoing provisions are cumulative and in addition to and not in limitation of any other rights or remedies available to the CITY.
- 19. <u>Notices to Parties</u>. Any statements, communications or notices to be provided pursuant to this Agreement must be sent to the attention of the persons indicated below. Each party agrees to promptly send notice of any changes of this information to the other party, at the address first above written.
- 20. <u>Business License</u>. The CONSULTANT is required to obtain a City of Escondido Business License prior to execution of this Agreement.
- 21. <u>Compliance with Applicable Laws, Permits and Licenses</u>. CONSULTANT shall keep itself informed of and comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, statutes, codes, ordinances, regulations, and rules in effect during the term of this Agreement. CONSULTANT shall obtain any and all licenses, permits, and authorizations necessary to perform services set forth in this Agreement. Neither CITY, nor any elected nor appointed boards, officers, officials, employees, or agents of CITY shall be liable, at law or in equity, as a result of any failure of CONSULTANT to comply with this section.

22. <u>Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986</u>. CONSULTANT shall keep itself informed of and comply with the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986. CONSULTANT affirms that as an employer in the State of California, all new employees must produce proof of eligibility to work in the United States within the first three days of employment and that only employees legally eligible to work in the United States will be employed on this public project. CONSULTANT agrees to comply with such provisions before commencing and continuously throughout the performance of this Agreement.

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Scope of Services

1.) STATEMENT OF WORK: Consultant will provide cost reduction consulting services to the City to reduce costs for the City's expenditures on certain services and programs as preauthorized by the City. Each specific contract, program, or expenditure that is proposed by Consultant for review shall be specifically provided in writing and approved by the City in writing prior to analysis by Consultant ("Expense Category"). No analysis of an Expense Category may be started until the scope of the Expense Category is provided in detail and agreed to by the City in writing. The provision of these cost reduction services for each Expense Category, in accordance with the Agreement and this Scope of Services shall be collectively referred to as the "Services."

Consultant shall obtain cost savings for City's benefit by analyzing City policies, procedures, supplier contracts, past invoices and other pertinent information as it relates to each Expense Category. Consultant will further gather information as to City's needs from City's service providers so as to build a solution that lowers costs and matches City's operational requirements and expectations. After analyzing the City's current spending patterns, Consultant shall provide City with a full report outlining Consultant's observations at no cost ("Report"). The Report will include a review of operations, cost reduction recommendations and potential service level enhancements. After reviewing the Report, the City may move forward with some or all of the recommendations, or the City may terminate the Services at no cost or further obligation to the City.

2.) POST REVIEW PHASE: For the entire balance of the relationship with City, Consultant will continue to consult with City in an effort to continuously look for efficiencies in the chosen areas of focus. Periodically Consultant will review City's invoicing and deliverables to ensure accountability by City's service providers with respect to the spirit and intent of the agreement between City and the third party service provider. This review will take into account service levels, cost controls and overall City satisfaction. This review must be done on at least a quarterly basis unless otherwise agreed to in writing. Further, Consultant will continuously consult with City to anticipate changes in service needs to ensure that the proper service provider, contract and procedures are in place to address City's go forward requirements. Any additional proposals for cost savings must be documented in a subsequent written report, using the same procedures and City approvals as provided for the initial Report.

3.) REVENUE SHARE: City has in place certain existing costs as it pertains to the requested Expense Categories selected for review ("Existing Costs"). The Report will document and propose Existing Costs for each service or product chosen for review and outline the methodology for the findings. City and PA will then discuss, agree and document the Existing Costs for the Expense Category. The City shall determine and approve the final Existing Costs methodology. After the City approves the Existing Costs, Consultant will produce an addendum to this agreement that outlines the Existing Costs, billing cycles and other operational details associated with implementation. If City elects to proceed with any or all of the recommendations as set forth in the Report, City agrees to compensate Consultant solely from the actual savings realized by the City over the term of this Agreement. Consultant will be entitled to 50% of the actual realized savings measured by the difference between the agreed upon Existing Costs and City's new costs as documented through actual realized savings ("Revenue Share"). The methodology for determining the new costs, including but not limited to, any increase in fixed, capital, or overhead costs must be approved by the City.

In some cases, the PA staff may discover over billing, credits, rebates or other sources of revenue. This income is to be considered expense reduction for purposes of this Agreement and will be accounted for in the same manner as the expense reduction savings. This revenue shall be shared with PA after the refunds or other credits are realized by Client.

4.) CITY PARTICIPATION: City shall give its full cooperation to Consultant in providing all required documents, invoices, contracts and staff consultation time in order to conduct the expense reduction review. For a 90 day period during the review process the City shall not make any material changes to the process, agreements or operations that would affect cost reduction review. The start date for the review period shall be agreed upon by both parties. During the course of the relationship between Consultant and City, City and Consultant understand that despite Consultant's recommendations, suggestions, potential suppliers and other proposals, City has the right not to proceed with said proposals. However, if City does pursue any or all of the documented review recommendations within one year which have not already been previously identified or planned on by the City, Consultant is entitled to the appropriate revenue share as outlined in Section 3 above. Any additional City request or engagement to review expenses not listed in this Scope of Services shall be in writing.

This Agreement shall commence with the Client's first PA invoice per expense category and will be in effect for a 36 month term. Each expense reduction category carries its own 36 month term/billing cycle commencing on the first invoice for that particular practice group. The parties may extend these services for one year by mutual written agreement.

5.) CONFIDENTIALITY: Each party shall maintain in strict confidence all information received from the other party in the performance of this Agreement. City acknowledges and agrees that any intellectual property developed or used by Consultant shall be the property of Consultant.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is requested that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2016-154; to revise the rates for Residential and Commercial Solid Waste and Recycling Services. Effective January 1, 2017, a 1.9757 percent increase would apply to all residential and commercial collection services.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

The increase in solid waste and recycling rates for residential and commercial accounts will result in an approximate two percent increase in the franchise fees, received by the General Fund. Residential rates will increase by \$0.36 per month. Commercial rates will increase by varying amounts, depending on individual service levels.

PREVIOUS ACTION:

On October 6, 1999, the City Council approved a contract with Escondido Disposal, Inc. and Escondido Resource Recovery, divisions of Refuse Services, Inc.; specifying rates to be charged for solid waste and recycling services. The contract established initial maximum rates paid by the ratepayers and gave the contractor the right to increase the maximum rates annually, according to the change in the previous year's Consumer Price Index (CPI).

The contract specifies that if the Escondido ratepayers' effective mean rate (the rate not including AB939, Household Hazardous Waste and Franchise fees) is not within the lowest 25 percent being charged in San Diego County, the City has the right to propose that EDI adjust its proposed rates to fall within the lowest 25 percent.

In accordance with these contract specifications, the following rate increases have been granted to EDI for basic residential and commercial collection services.

Household Hazardous Waste fees and AB939 fees were established in 1994 at \$0.25 and \$0.21 per month, respectively. On July 1, 2003, Household Hazardous Waste fees were increased from \$0.25 to \$0.35 per month. On January 1, 2006, Household Hazardous Waste fees were increased from \$0.35 to \$0.52 per month. No increases in either the AB939 or Household Hazardous Waste fees are

being requested at this time. The franchise fee also remains at 10 percent of gross receipts. These fees apply equally to both residential and commercial collections and all solid waste and recycling services.

BACKGROUND:

On August 19, 2016 the City received notification from Escondido Disposal, Inc., regarding an increase in the solid waste and recycling rates in accordance with Section 8 (C) of the Solid Waste Disposal and Recycling Franchise Agreement. The rate increases are based on the 1.9757 percent change in the CPI between the first half of 2015 and the first half of 2016 (Exhibit "A"), after adjustments to keep the Escondido ratepayers' effective mean rate within the lowest 25 percent in San Diego County. After review and discussion, it was determined that the contractual CPI formula allows for a 1.9757 percent residential and commercial rate increases effective January 1, 2017. Commercial and residential rate increase notices will be mailed to customers in November 2016.

Under the proposed CPI rate increase of 1.9757 percent for residential accounts, the total monthly rate for curbside trash and recycling collection will increase by \$0.36 per month, from \$18.85 to \$19.21.The residential effective mean rate (the rate not including AB939, Household Hazardous Waste and Franchise fees) for the same service is currently \$16.31 and is proposed to increase to \$16.63. The last residential rate increase was in 2016 and was 0.789 percent.

Under the proposed CPI rate increase of 1.9757 percent for commercial accounts, the total monthly rate for a three yard permanent bin collected once per week will increase by \$1.95 per month, from \$99.34 to \$101.29. The commercial effective mean rate for the same service is currently \$88.75 and is proposed to increase to \$90.50. The last commercial rate increase was in 2016 and was 0.789 percent.

The proposed 1.9757 percent residential and commercial increase for CPI will become effective January 1, 2017 and applies to all residential and commercial collection rates and services as presented in Exhibit "A".

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ESCONDIDO, CALIFORNIA, AUTHORIZING AN ANNUAL CONSUMER PRICE INDEX INCREASE IN THE RATES FOR RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING SERVICES PROVIDED BY REFUSE SERVICES, INC.

WHEREAS, in October 1999 the City entered into a Solid Waste Disposal and Recycling Franchise Agreement (the "Agreement") with Escondido Resource Recovery and Escondido Disposal, Inc., Divisions of Refuse Services, Inc., to provide residential, commercial and industrial trash, and recycling collection services; and

WHEREAS, section 8(C) of the Agreement grants an annual increase in the rates not to exceed the percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index ("CPI") for the year, upon receipt of written notice of the proposed increase; and

WHEREAS, Escondido Disposal has requested in a letter dated and received August 19, 2016, an increase in the residential and commercial rates fees to be effective January 1, 2017; and

WHEREAS, revised residential and commercial rates and fees were last approved on January 7, 2015, with a March 1, 2015 effective date for the residential fees, and a January 7, 2015 effective date for the commercial fees; and

WHEREAS, the proposed revised residential and commercial rates and fees, to be effective January 1, 2017, and the calculation of the increased percentage in the Consumer Price Index are attached as Exhibit "A"; and WHEREAS, notice of the residential and commercial rates revised for the allowed annual CPI increase are being mailed to all affected customers in Escondido in November 2016; and

WHEREAS, the Public Works Director/City Engineer recommends approval of the proposed increase in Solid Waste Disposal and Recycling rates and fees for residential and commercial accounts, effective January 1, 2017;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Escondido, California, as follows:

1. That the above recitations are true.

2. That the City Council hereby accepts the recommendation of the Public Works Director/City Engineer.

3. That the Mayor and City Clerk are authorized to adopt, on behalf of the City, an increase in the rates and fees for Solid Waste Disposal and Recycling Services for residential and commercial accounts effective January 1, 2017. SUBJECT: Establish Engineering and Traffic Surveys (Speed Zones) at Seven Locations Citywide

RECOMMENDATION:

It is requested that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2016-165 to establish Engineering and Traffic Surveys (Speed Zones) at seven (7) locations Citywide.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

Funds are available within the fabrication and installation costs fund for the signage at the seven (7) locations.

PREVIOUS ACTION:

The Transportation and Community Safety Commission approved the recommended speed zones at their meetings on October 8, 2015, January 14, 2016, and October 13, 2016.

BACKGROUND:

To satisfy the requirements of Section 40802(b) of the California Vehicle Code, Engineering and Traffic Surveys are required by the State of California to establish speed limits and to enforce those limits using radar or other speed measuring devices. These surveys must be updated periodically (every five, seven, or ten years, depending upon specific criteria), to ensure the speed limits reflect current conditions as dictated by the 2016 California Vehicle Code. The surveys must be conducted following the procedures outlined in the California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (CA-MUTCD) dated November 7, 2014, and in accordance with applicable provisions of the California Vehicle Code Section 627, titled "Engineering and Traffic Survey."

The CA-MUTCD guidelines state that 85 percent of drivers are traveling at a safe and reasonable speed, and that this 85th percentile speed is the parameter of a speed survey that should be used to determine a legally enforceable posted speed limit. Based on this principle, and other speed survey standards, staff is recommending the establishment of one (1) new speed zone and six (6) speed surveys, that are an update of the current posted speed limits.

Establish Engineering and Traffic Surveys (Speed Zones) at Seven Locations Citywide November 16, 2016 Page 2

The results of all the speed surveys and recommended speed limits are listed in Table 1. The last column shows the recommended speed limit, per the Traffic Engineer's engineering judgment in matching existing conditions with the traffic safety needs of the community.

Citracado Parkway is a Major Road and does not currently have a posted speed limit. Based on the 85th percentile speed, staff recommends a posted speed of 35 mph along with the existing 25 mph limit when children are present (school zone).

On Broadway between North Avenue and Jesmond Dene, staff recommends a decrease in the speed limit from 50 mph to 45 mph. The 85th percentile speed indicates that 45mph is the safe and appropriate speed for this roadway.

On Broadway from Rincon to Leslie Lane, staff recommends a decrease in the speed limit from 45 mph to 40 mph along with the existing 25 mph limit when children are present (school zone). The 85th percentile speed indicates posting a speed limit of 45 mph. Due to road geometrics, pedestrian and bicycle safety, and to maintain a long segment at a uniform and safe speed, staff sees that downgrading of the 85th percentile is justified.

Establish Engineering and Traffic Surveys (Speed Zones) at Several Citywide Locations November 16, 2016 Page 3

On Chestnut Street between Juniper and Fifth St/Date St, staff recommends a decrease in the speed limit from 40 mph to 35 mph. The 85th percentile speed indicates that 35 mph is the safe and appropriate speed for this roadway.

On Ash Street between Rincon and City Limit, staff recommends a decrease in the speed limit from 40 mph to 35 mph. The 85th percentile speed indicates that 35 mph is the safe and appropriate speed for this roadway.

On Vista Verde Way from El Norte Parkway to the end, staff recommends a decrease in the speed limit from 35 mph to 30mph. The 85th percentile speed indicates that 30 mph is the safe and appropriate speed for this roadway.

On Idaho Avenue from Juniper Street to Pedregal Drive/City Limit, staff recommends a decrease in the speed limit from 40 mph to 35 mph. The 85th percentile speed indicates that 35 mph is the safe and appropriate speed for this roadway.

Staff recommendations for all seven segments are consistent with the results of the current speed surveys and in compliance with requirements of the California Vehicle Code, and the Caltrans - California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices.

6. Advanced disability pension payments will not be made as Ms. Provost filed for a Service Retirement pending Industrial Disability Retirement as of November 18, 2016. Ms. Provost's last day on payroll will be November 17, 2016.

7. That the City Council of the City of Escondido finds that Ms. Provost's disability is orthopedic in nature, and arose out of and in the course of employment.

It is requested that the City Council authorize the Escondido Police Department to accept a FY 2016-17 Citizens' Options for Public Safety (COPS) Program Grant in the amount of \$232,178; approve grant expenditures consistent with guidelines in AB 1913; authorize the Chief of Police or his designee to execute grant documents on behalf of the City; and approve budget adjustments needed to spend grant funds.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

This action will have no impact on the General Fund Budget. Grant funds will be used to pay salary and overhead expenses for temporary, part-time employees.

PREVIOUS ACTION:

On November 18, 2015, the City Council accepted a FY 2015-16 COPS Program Grant in the amount of \$230,235.

BACKGROUND:

Existing law establishes Supplemental Law Enforcement Services Funds and requires monies from these funds to be allocated to counties and cities for purposes of the Citizens' Options for Public Safety (COPS) Program. In September 2000, the California State Legislature chaptered AB 1913, the Schiff-Cardenas Crime Prevention Act of 2000, which increased appropriations for these funds and established new formulas for State Citizens' Options for Public Safety (COPS) allocations.

As a result of these actions, the City of Escondido will receive a FY 2016-17 COPS Grant. Due to the uncertainty of the funding level and the continued possibility of a statewide reallocation of funds, as was experienced in past years, the State has recommended that each city adopt a conservative spending plan and if necessary, amend that plan later in the year when more information is available. The minimum award per jurisdiction is \$100,000.

FY 2016-17 State of California Citizens' Options for Public Safety (COPS) Program Grant November 16, 2016 Page 2

According to the law, COPS funds may only be spent to provide front-line law enforcement services, which include anti-gang, crime prevention and juvenile justice programs. They may not supplant existing funding and they must supplement law enforcement services.

Government Code Section 30061 requires that Supplemental Local Law Enforcement Fund monies allocated to counties must be deposited in a Supplemental Law Enforcement Services Fund (SLESF). Cities who receive SLESF allocations must deposit them in their own SLESF prior to expending funds. SLESF allocations may not be intermingled with other city funds and they must draw interest until spent. The City of Escondido established a SLESF account in 1996 and has maintained it since that time for COPS grant allocations.

The Police Department has examined needs for law enforcement services in the community and recommends to use this year's COPS allocation to fund salary and benefts for temporary part-time positions that, due to budget constraints, have been reduced or eliminated from the General Fund Budget. Positions funded by the allocation may include, data entry technicians, custody transport officers, polygraphers, a background investigator, a forensic technician, a property and evidence technician, a department specialist in the Internal Affairs Unit, a department specialist in the Traffic Division, and department specialists in the Investigations Bureau.

- **SUBJECT:** Adoption of Changes to the City of Escondido Fee Inventory Alarm Billing and Registration

RECOMMENDATION:

It is requested that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2016-169 approving proposed changes to the City of Escondido Fee Inventory.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

Alarm fee changes are being proposed to update existing City fees to ensure appropriate cost recovery. Appropriate cost recovery means that alarm fees charged by the City are near the City's cost of providing services.

BACKGROUND:

Alarm Program Administration Services

Police Department and Finance Department staff recently established an agreement with Alarm Program Systems, LLC. This vendor will provide alarm program administration services including registration and billing. Partnering with Alarm Program Systems, LLC, allows the City to provide an automated method for its citizens to manage their alarm systems.

Establishing a new alarm program administration service can increase safety through improved compliance and reduce false alarms through education. Alarm Program Systems, LLC offers alarm school through an interactive, educational, online alarm course. Alarm school will be available for all citizens with a registered alarm. Alarm school participation may also reduce certain penalties associated with false alarm fees.

Alarm Fees

Police Department and Finance Department staff reviewed the City's alarm registration and false alarm billing fees. The evaluation included analysis of current Police Department response costs and City staff costs.

To recoup costs associated with Police Department responses and City services, the following new fees are proposed:

SUBJECT: A First Amendment to Power Purchase Agreement with Escondido Bioenergy Facility at the Hale Avenue Resource Recovery Facility

RECOMMENDATION:

It is requested that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2016-170, authorizing a First Amendment to the Power Purchase Agreement with Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

The existing Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) is projected to reduce both electric and natural gas costs at the Hale Avenue Resource Recovery Facility (HARRF). The proposed amendment does not change the starting price or annual escalator of the existing PPA. The amendment requires the City to purchase additional energy from Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC, if the HARRF uses more than 8,146 MWh of electric energy per year. Although more money will be expended from the Wastewater Fund via this agreement, the net energy expenditure is projected to decrease from avoided San Diego Gas and Electric (SDG&E) purchases. The exact amount of savings will depend on future energy prices charged by San Diego Gas and Electric (SDG&E).

PREVIOUS ACTION:

On July 8, 2015, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2015-107, authorizing the Mayor and City Clerk to execute a twenty-year PPA with Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC, and authorizing the Director of Utilities to execute a Site License Agreement with Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC, for constructing and operating a cogeneration facility at the HARRF.

BACKGROUND:

The Utilities Department operates the HARRF to provide wastewater treatment and recycled water production for the City. Solids removed from the wastewater stream in the primary and secondary treatment processes are processed in onsite sludge digesters. The digestion process generates large quantities of biogas, with methane being a large component of this gas. Currently, all of this methane is disposed with no beneficial use through a flare. The total volume of biogas flared each year is approximately 100 million cubic feet, which represents a large missed opportunity to offset energy use at the HARRF. It is also more environmentally prudent to beneficially use the gas rather than simply flaring it.

Amendment to Power Purchase Agreement – Digester Gas at HARRF November 16, 2016 Page 2

To date, construction has not begun on the HARRF's cogeneration facility. The amended PPA will not only improve terms for the City, but will also provide Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC with the confidence to move forward on the project's construction.

This amendment proposes five modifications to the existing PPA; all other terms of the PPA will remain the same. The proposed modifications include: 1) adding a Net Energy Metering requirement; 2) removing the Self Generation Incentive Program requirement; 3) changing the energy purchase requirement; 4) expanding the allowance for termination of the PPA; and 5) coordinating planned cogeneration facility maintenance.

The proposed amendment requires Net Energy Metering (NEM) for the HARRF. NEM is an electrical energy metering and billing mechanism that would allow the City to receive financial credits for power generated by the cogeneration facility and fed back to SDG&E. This would allow for greater operational flexibility of the cogeneration facility and significantly reduce risk to the HARRF. The existing PPA requires that the cogeneration facility be throttled down to produce the exact amount of energy that the HARRF is consuming at a specific moment. This could put the HARRF at risk of power outages due to tripped circuit breakers if the cogeneration facility produces more power than the HARRF is using at a given instant.

Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC, originally relied on project funding from the Self Generation Incentive Program (SGIP). In addition, the existing PPA requires that Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC, receive a SGIP reservation confirmation from the SGIP administrator for the full incentive amount for which the project is eligible. Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC, was not successful in obtaining a SGIP award in 2016. It is not known whether they will be able to obtain a SGIP award in 2017, therefore this amendment replaces the SGIP requirement with a statement regarding full financing from a third party financing institution.

The existing PPA requires that the City purchase 100 percent of the energy produced by the cogeneration facility up to 8,146 MWh per year. This amendment modifies the requirement to be 100 percent of the energy produced by the cogeneration facility up to 8,146 MWh, or to the HARRF's actual annual energy usage, whichever is greater.

The existing PPA does not allow the City to terminate the PPA for any reason without triggering the default provisions. This amendment will modify the existing PPA to allow either party to terminate the PPA without triggering the default provisions, if construction of the facility is not started within three years of the date of the signed Amendment.

A statement will be added that requires planned maintenance of the cogeneration facility to be coordinated with HARRF staff, and to be performed during SDG&E off-peak times when possible. This will minimize peak, semi-peak, and non-coincident demand charges from SDG&E, which are significantly higher than off-peak demand charges.

The proposed amendment is beneficial to the City and Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC. If the amendment is approved, Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC, plans to expedite the construction of the project.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ESCONDIDO, CALIFORNIA, AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND CITY CLERK TO EXECUTE, ON BEHALF OF THE CITY, A FIRST AMENDMENT TO THE POWER PURCHASE AGREEMENT WITH ESCONDIDO BIOENERGY FACILITY, LLC

WHEREAS, the treatment at the HARRF includes anaerobic digesters for the processing of solids removed through the treatment process; and

WHEREAS, a natural byproduct of the digestion process is methane gas, and historically, the methane produced has been burned in a flare; and

WHEREAS, on July 8, 2015, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2015-107,

authorizing execution of a Power Purchase Agreement with Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC; and

WHEREAS, the Power Purchase Agreement needs to be amended to accommodate changed conditions and improve operational flexibility; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Utilities recommends a First Amendment to the Power Purchase Agreement ("Amendment") with Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC be approved; and

WHEREAS, this City Council desires at this time and deems it to be in the best public interest, to approve said Amendment with Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Escondido, California, as follows:

1. That the above recitations are true.

2. That the Mayor and City Council accepts the recommendation of the Director of Utilities.

3. That the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized to execute, on behalf of the City, an Amendment to the Power Purchase Agreement with Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC. A copy of the Amendment is attached as Exhibit "1" and is incorporated by this reference.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO

THE POWER PURCHASE AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN ESCONDIDO BIOENERGY FACILITY, LLC AND CITY OF ESCONDIDO

This First Amendment to the Power Purchase Agreement ("<u>Amendment</u>"), dated as of _______, 2016, ("<u>Effective Date</u>") is entered into by and between ESCONDIDO BIOENERGY FACILITY, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company ("<u>Provider</u>"), and CITY OF ESCONDIDO, a Municipal Corporation in the County of San Diego ("<u>Customer</u>").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Customer and Provider, are parties to that certain Power Purchase Agreement dated as of July 21, 2015 ("<u>Agreement</u>"); and

WHEREAS, Customer and Provider have agreed upon certain changes to the Agreement by way of this Amendment, which will effectuate upon the approval of SDG&E to allow Net Energy Metering; and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises set forth below, recitals above, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties hereby agree to Amend the Agreement as follows:

AGREEMENT

The respective rights and obligations of the Parties under this Amendment are expressly conditioned upon the satisfaction in full (or in written waiver by both Parties) of SDG&E allowing for Net Energy Metering for the Escondido HARRF. Net Energy Metering means an electrical energy metering and billing mechanism that would allow Customer to be able to receive financial credits for power generated by Customer's onsite system and fed back to the utility, SDG&E. Said Net Energy Metering shall be installed by Provider at Provider's sole cost, prior to operation of the System.

1. Addition of the following definitions to Section 1.

- a. "Project" means the Provider's System and any related improvement such as pipes, wires, foundations, enclosures and other equipment to provide services to the Customer as contemplated for under this Agreement.
- b. "SGIP Award" means an award from the Self Generation Incentive Program for the Project.

1 of 4 First Amendment to the Power Purchase Agreement 2. <u>Delete Section 2, paragraph 2 in its entirety:</u>

Customer acknowledges and agrees that Provider may export a portion of the electricity produces that is not purchased by customer, if an export tariff is available, to the Utility grid during the Term. Provider reserves the right to execute this option at its sole discretion, with reasonable notice to be provided to Customer prior to the export of such power. Any benefit of such export of energy will be accrued to the Provider.

and replace with the following

Provider acknowledges and agrees that Customer may export a portion of the electricity purchased, if an export tariff is available, to the Utility grid during the Term. Customer reserves the right to execute this option at its sole discretion, with reasonable notice to be provided to Provider prior to the export of such power. Any benefit of such export of energy will be accrued to the Customer.

3. <u>Delete Section 3.2.6 in its entirety</u>:

3.2.6 Provider or Customer shall have received an SGIP reservation confirmation from SGIP administrator for the full incentive amount for which the project is eligible.

and replace with the following

3.2.6 Provider has closed full financing for the Project and shall have reached written agreement with the third party financing institution, pursuant to which Provider may assign some or all of its rights and obligations hereunder to such third party (or its designated corporate Affiliate) and will be negotiated prior to consummation of the financing for the Project.

4. *Delete Section 3.2.7 in its entirety:*

Successful completion of the Conditions in Sections 3.2.1 - 3.2.6 above and Section 3.3 below shall be conditions precedent to Provider's obligations under this Agreement. If the activities contemplated in Sections 3.2.1 - 3.2.6 above and Section 3.3. are not completed by the construction date, Provider shall have the option to terminate the Agreement without triggering the default provisions of this Agreement and neither party shall have any further liability under this Agreement. Alternatively, in the event that such conditions precedent are not satisfied by such date, the Parties may mutually agree to amend this Agreement as necessary and to revise the Commercial Operation Date and term of this Agreement.

and replace with the following

3.2.7 Successful completion of the Conditions in Sections 3.2.1 - 3.2.6 above and Section 3.3 below shall be conditions precedent to Provider's obligations under this Agreement. If the activities contemplated in Sections 3.2.1 - 3.2.6 above and Section 3.3 are not completed by the construction start date or within 3 years, whichever is earlier, the Parties shall have the option to terminate the Agreement without triggering the default provisions of this Agreement and neither party shall have any further liability under this Agreement. Alternatively, in the event that such conditions precedent are not satisfied by such date, the Parties may mutually agree to amend this Agreement as necessary and to revise the Commercial Operation Date and term of this Agreement.

5. <u>Add the following sentence to the end of Section 4.1.1</u>: "All planned O&M Work shall be coordinated with HARRF personnel, which will be completed during SDG&E off-peak time as reasonably possible."

6. <u>Delete the first sentence of Section 5.1 only</u>.

5.1 <u>Purchase Requirement</u>. Customer agrees to purchase one hundred percent (100%) of the Energy up to 8,146 MWh per year delivered or deemed delivered under Section 6 and by such System during the Term of this Agreement.

and replace in its entirety

<u>Purchase Requirement</u>. During the Term of this Agreement, Customer agrees to purchase from Provider one hundred (100%) of the Energy up to 8,146 MWh or HARRF's actual annual usage of Energy delivered, directly or through net metering, whichever is greater per year delivered or deemed delivered under Section 6.

Except as expressly set forth herein, the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect. In the event there is any inconsistency between the terms hereof and the Agreement, this Amendment shall control.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is requested that Council introduce Ordinances Nos. 2016-09 and 2016-17, amending the City of Escondido Municipal Code to reflect the 2016 California Building, Fire, Residential, Plumbing, Electrical, Mechanical and Energy Codes, Green Building Standards Code, and proposed local amendments.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

No anticipated impact on the general fund.

BACKGROUND:

Every three years the State of California Building Standards Commission adopts model codes as the basis for the California Building Standards Code (CBSC). The adopted codes, California Code of Regulations (CCR), Title 24, provide a common set of rules and regulations throughout the state. The CBSC is a compilation of three types of building criteria from three different origins:

- Building standards that have been adopted by state agencies without change from building standards contained in national model codes;
- Building standards that have been adopted and adapted from the national model code standards to meet California conditions; and
- Building standards, authorized by the California legislature, that constitute extensive additions not covered by the model codes that have been adopted to address particular California concerns.

Adoption of 2016 Codes November 16, 2016 Page 2

The State recently modified and adopted, effective on January 1, 2017, the following:

- 2016 California Building Code (based on the 2015 International Building Code)
- 2016 California Fire Code (based on the 2015 International Fire Code)
- 2016 California Residential Code (based on the 2015 International Residential Code)
- 2016 California Plumbing Code (based on the 2015 Uniform Plumbing Code)
- 2016 California Electrical Code (based on the 2014 National Electrical Code)
- 2016 California Mechanical Code (based on the 2015 Uniform Mechanical Code)
- 2016 California Green Building Standards Code
- 2016 California Energy Code

DISCUSSION:

The changes to the uniform codes are minimal and should impose no substantial changes on the City of Escondido residents or their contractors. Adoption of the codes will allow the Building Division and Fire Department to enforce the most recent state standards.

In 2013 the City of Escondido adopted the County Consolidated Code and the 2013 California Fire Code. Both codes were adopted to provide uniformity throughout the city and county areas. We have determined the adoption of the County Consolidated Code placed undo restrictions on the city, therefore the city will only be adopting and enforcing the California Fire Code with local amendments.

Basic changes from the 2013 California Fire Code:

• There are no substantial changes from the 2013 California Fire Code to the new 2016 California Fire Code

Local amendments to the 2016 California Fire Code:

- An existing road phasing policy for single family dwellings on existing legal parcels has been deleted.
- An existing sprinkler requirement for tenant improvements in Group R occupancies has been deleted.
- An existing section on blasting operations has been deleted.
- An existing section on mid-rise buildings has been modified to reduce the requirements. The existing height for a mid-rise building is three stories or greater. The proposed code defines mid-rise buildings at five stories or more. In addition, the existing section requires mid-rise buildings to be in compliance with all of the requirements of a high-rise building. This section has been modified to meet only some of the requirements of a high-rise building.

The remaining changes are administrative.

The Building Advisory and Appeals Board members were provided a copy of the proposed ordinance, findings and local amendments.

ORDINANCE NO. 2016-09

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ESCONDIDO, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 11 OF THE ESCONDIDO MUNICIPAL CODE TO ADOPT THE 2016 CALIFORNIA FIRE CODE AND LOCAL AMENDMENTS

WHEREAS, the State of California Building Standards Commission is charged with the development of uniform codes and regulations for application to the construction of buildings within the state; and

WHEREAS, California Health and Safety Code Section 17960 requires the City enforce within its jurisdiction all the provisions published in the State Buildings Standards Code and the provisions of other rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to the provisions of the California Health and Safety Code pertaining to the erection, construction, reconstruction, movement, enlargement, conversion, alteration, repair, removal, or arrangement of apartments, hotels or dwellings; and

WHEREAS, every three years the California Building Standards Commission updates and adopts uniform codes for application throughout the state; and

WHEREAS, California Health and Safety Code Section 17958.7 allows local amendments to the California Building Standards Codes, when such codes are amended and adopted at the local level, and when local findings are made for unique climatic, geological or topographical conditions.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Escondido, California, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN as follows:

SECTION 1. Escondido Municipal Code Chapter 11, Article 2, Sections 11-15 and 11-16 are repealed and replaced as provided in Attachment "A," which in incorporated herein.

SECTION 2. That the City Council expressly finds that Escondido's unique climate, geology, and topography and the Escondido Fire Department's capabilities to provide fire prevention and protection services to the City and surrounding communities, make the modifications to the California Fire Code contained in this Ordinance, necessary for the health and safety of the community. The local amendments are necessary because the entire City is in a moderate, high or very high fire severity zone.

SECTION 3. SEPARABILITY. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions thereof.

SECTION 4. That as of the effective date of this ordinance, all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5. That the City Clerk is hereby directed to certify to the passage of this ordinance and to cause the same or a summary to be prepared in accordance with Government Code Section 36933, to be published one time within 15 days of its passage in a newspaper of general circulation, printed and published in the County and circulated in the City of Escondido.

Attachment "A"

Sec 11-15. California Fire Code.

- (a) The 2016 California Fire Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24,
 Part 9, including Appendix Chapters 4, B, C, I, and N, as published by the International Code Council is adopted by the City of Escondido.
- (b) The Fire Marshall shall maintain copies of the California Fire Code and the City of Escondido amendments and make copies available for public review at the Police and Fire Department Headquarters.

Sec. 11-16. Local amendments.

Sec. 11-16 (305.6). Rockets, model aircraft and similar devices.

Rockets, model airplanes, sky lanterns, floating luminary or similar devices powered with an engine, open flame or other flammable propellant shall not be projected into or across any moderate, high or very high fire severity zone without prior approval of the fire code official.

Sec. 11-16 (320). Mid-rise buildings.

Sec. 11-16 (320.1). General.

A Mid-rise building has five stories or more, but does not exceed 75 feet in height, on any side. A newly constructed mid-rise building or a mid-rise building which undergoes a complete renovation that requires the building to be completely vacated shall comply with this section. Exceptions:

- 1. Buildings used exclusively as an open parking garage.
- 2. Buildings where all floors above the fifth floor level are used exclusively as an open parking garage.
- 3. Buildings such as a power plant, lookout tower, steeple, grain house, and other similar structures with intermittent human occupancy.

Sec. 11-18 (320.1.1). Automatic fire sprinkler systems and standpipes.

Mid-rise buildings shall be protected throughout by an automatic fire sprinkler system designed and installed in conformance with the latest edition of NFPA 13 and in accordance with the following:

1. A shut-off valve and a water flow alarm shall be provided for each floor. Each shut-off valve and water flow alarm shall be electronically supervised.

2 Mid-rise buildings shall be provided with a class I standpipe system that is interconnected with the automatic fire sprinkler system. The system shall consist of 2½-inch hose valves located in each stair enclosure on every floor. Two hose outlets shall be located on the roof outside of each stair enclosure which penetrates the roof. The standpipe system shall be designed, installed and tested in accordance with the latest edition of NFPA 14.

11-16 (320.1.3.). Fire alarm system.

An approved and listed, automatic and manual, fully addressable and electronically-supervised fire alarm system shall be provided in conformance with this code and the California Building Code.

Sec. 11-16 (320.1.4). Emergency voice alarm signaling system.

The operation of any automatic fire detector or water flow device shall automatically sound an alert tone followed by a pre-recorded voice instruction giving appropriate information and direction on a general or selective basis to the following terminal areas:

- 1. Elevators
- 2. Elevator lobbies
- 3. Corridors
- 4. Exit stairways
- 5. Rooms and tenant spaces
- 6. Dwelling units
- 7. Hotel guest rooms
- 8. Areas designated as safe refuge within the building

Sec. 11-16 (320.1.5). Fire command center.

A fire command center for fire department operations may be required. The location and accessibility of the fire command center shall be approved by the fire department. The room shall be separated from the remainder of the building by not less than a 1-hour fire barrier. The room shall be a minimum of 200 square feet with a minimum dimension of 10 feet. It shall contain the following facilities at a minimum:

- 1. Voice alarm and public address panels
- 2. Fire department communications panel
- 3. Fire alarm enunciator panel
- 4. Elevator enunciator panel (when building exceeds 55 feet in height)
- 5. Status indicators and controls for air-handling systems (stairwell pressurization)
- 6. Controls for unlocking stairwell doors
- 7. Fire pump status indicators (if required)

- 8. Set of complete building plans
- 9. Elevator control switches for switching of emergency power
- 10. Work table

Sec. 11-16 (320.1.6). Annunciation identification.

Control panels in the central control station shall be permanently identified as to their function. Water flow, automatic fire detection and manually-activated fire alarms, and supervisory and trouble signals shall be monitored by an approved UL-listed central monitoring station and annunciated in the fire command center by means of an audible and visual indicator. For the purposes of annunciation, zoning shall be in accordance with the following:

1. When the system serves more than one building, each building shall be a separate zone.

2. Each floor in a building shall be a separate zone.

3. When one or more risers serve the same floor, each riser shall be a separate zone.

Sec. 11-16 (320.1.8). Fire Department communication system.

An approved two-way fire department communication system designed and installed in accordance with NFPA 72 shall be provided for fire department use per section 907.2.13.2.

Sec. 11-16. (320.1.9.2). Pressurized enclosures and stairways.

All required stairways and enclosures in a mid-rise building shall be pressurized as specified in section 909. Pressurized stairways shall be designed to exhaust smoke manually when needed.

Sec. 11-16 (320.1.9.3). Vestibules.

Pressurized stairway enclosures serving a mid-rise building shall be provided with a pressurized entrance vestibule on each floor that complies with section 909.

Sec. 11-16 (320.1.9.4). Pressure differences.

The minimum pressure difference between a vestibule and adjacent areas shall comply with section 909.

Sec. 11-16 (320.1.9.5). Locking of stairway doors.

All stairway doors that are locked to prohibit access from the interior of the stairway shall have the capability of being unlocked simultaneously, without unlatching, upon a signal from the fire command center. Upon failure of normal electrical service or activation of any fire alarm, the locking mechanism shall automatically retract to the unlocked position.

A telephone or other two-way communication system connected to an approved emergency service which operates continuously shall be provided at not less than every third floor in each required exit stairway vestibule.

Approved signage stating doors are locked shall be provided in each stairwell vestibule on each floor in which entry may be made and on each floor in which a telephone is located. Hardware for locking stairway vestibule doors shall be State Fire Marshal listed and approved by the chief by permit before installation. Stairway doors located between the vestibules and the stairway shaft shall not be locked.

Sec. 11-16 (505.4). Directory map.

A lighted directory map, meeting current fire department standards, shall be installed at the driveway entrance to a residential project or a mobile home park, with more than 15 units.

Sec. 11-16 (505.5). Response map updates.

Any new development which necessitates updating emergency response maps due to new structures, hydrants, roadways or similar features shall be required to provide map updates in a format compatible with current department mapping services and shall be charged a reasonable fee for updating all response maps.

Sec. 11-16 (5704.2.9.6.1). Locations where above-ground tanks are prohibited.

Storage of Class I and II liquids in above-ground tanks outside of buildings is prohibited within the City of Escondido except for areas zoned for commercial use, industrial use, or agricultural use or as approved by the Fire Code Official.

Exceptions:

1. In areas zoned for other than residential uses, when approved by the fire code official.

2. Crankcase draining may be stored in specially constructed aboveground storage tanks, approved by the fire code official, with a maximum capacity of five hundred fifty (550) gallons. Such tanks may be located within a building when the fire code official deems appropriate and the container meets U.L. Standard 2085. Containers shall be installed and used in accordance with their listing, and provisions shall be made for leak and spill containment. In no case shall storage be allowed in residential or institutional property. The fire

code official may disapprove the installation of such containers when is his or her opinion their use presents a risk to life or property.

3. With the fire code official's approval, class I and II liquids may be stored aboveground outside of buildings in specially designed, approved, and listed containers which meet U.L. Standard 2085. Containers shall be installed and used in accordance with their listing, and provisions shall be made for leak and spill containment. The fire code official may disapprove the installation of such containers when in his or her opinion their use presents a risk to life or property.

Sec. 11-16 (5706.2.4.4). Locations where above-ground tanks are prohibited.

The storage of Class I and II liquids in above-ground tanks is prohibited in residential areas within The City of Escondido. Exceptions to these limits may be granted by the Fire Code Official when it can be demonstrated that the proposed exception poses no significant risk to life or property.

Exceptions:

1. In areas zoned for other than residential uses, when approved by the fire code official.

2. Crankcase draining may be stored in specially constructed aboveground storage tanks, approved by the fire code official, with a maximum capacity of five hundred fifty (550) gallons. Such tanks may be located within a building when the fire code official deems appropriate and the container meets U.L. Standard 2085. Containers shall be installed and used in accordance with

their listing, and provisions shall be made for leak and spill containment. In no case shall storage be allowed in residential or institutional property. The fire code official may disapprove the installation of such containers when is his or her opinion their use presents a risk to life or property.

3. With the fire code official's approval, class I and II liquids may be stored aboveground outside of buildings in specially designed, approved, and listed containers which meet U.L. Standard 2085. Containers shall be installed and used in accordance with their listing, and provisions shall be made for leak and spill containment. The fire code official may disapprove the installation of such containers when in his or her opinion their use presents a risk to life or property.

Sec. 11-16 (6104.2). Maximum capacity within established limits.

The storage of liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) is prohibited within the City of Escondido, except for areas zoned for commercial use, industrial use, or agricultural use. Storage shall be in accordance with the California Fire Code and NFPA 58. The aggregate capacity of any one installation shall not exceed a water capacity of 2,000 gallons unless approved by the Fire Code Official. This section shall not prohibit the use of LPG for the purpose of cooking on a grill when use and storage are in accordance with the California Fire Code and NFPA 58. Additional locations and maximum quantities may be considered by the Fire Code Official when it can be demonstrated that the proposed exception poses no significant risk to life or property and there is a sufficient response capability by the Escondido Fire Department.

Sec. 11-16 (Chapter 80). Referenced Standards.

Chapter 80 Referenced Standard NFPA 13D is revised to read:

7.6 Alarms.

A water flow switch shall be provided and located on the sprinkler riser above the check valve and main drain and shall actuate an audible fire alarm signal bell. The water flow switch shall be a retarding type with a delay between 15-60 seconds before activation of the signal bell. Alarm bell shall have a minimum diameter of 8 inches and be mounted on the exterior in the vicinity of the master bedroom. The alarm bell shall be clearly audible in all bedrooms with intervening doors closed.

ORDINANCE NO. 2016-17

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ESCONDIDO, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 6 OF THE ESCONDIDO MUNICIPAL CODE, TO ADOPT THE 2016 CALIFORNIA BUILDING, RESIDENTIAL, PLUMBING, ELECTRICAL, MECHANICAL, AND ENERGY CODES, AND THE GREEN BUILDING STANDARDS CODE

WHEREAS, the State of California Building Standards Commission is charged with the development of uniform codes and regulations for application to the construction of buildings within the state; and

WHEREAS, California Health and Safety Code Section 17960 requires the City enforce within its jurisdiction all the provisions published in the State Buildings Standards Code and the provisions of other rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to the provisions of the California Health and Safety Code pertaining to the erection, construction, reconstruction, movement, enlargement, conversion, alteration, repair, removal, or arrangement of apartments, hotels or dwellings; and

WHEREAS, every three years the California Building Standards Commission updates and adopts uniform codes for application throughout the state; and

WHEREAS, California Health and Safety Code Section 17958.7 allows local amendments to the California Building Standards Codes, when such codes are amended and adopted at the local level, and when local findings are made for unique climatic, geological or topographical conditions; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Escondido, California, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN as follows: SECTION 1. That Escondido Municipal Code Chapter 6, Article 1, Section 6-

1.2 is repealed and replaced with the following:

Sec. 6-1.2. Codes adopted.

The following technical codes are adopted by the City of Escondido:

- (a) The 2016 California Building Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24, Part 2, (including Chapter 29, and Appendix Chapters C and I.
- (b) The 2016 California Residential Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24, Part 2.5, including Appendix Chapter H.
- (c) The 2016 California Electrical Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24, Part 3.
- (d) The 2016 California Mechanical Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24, Part 4.
- (e) The 2016 California Plumbing Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24, Part 5, including Appendix Chapters A, D and H.
- (f) The 2016 California Historical Building Code, California Code of Regulations Title 24, Part 8.
- (g) The 2016 California Existing Building Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24, Part 10.
- (h) The 2016 California Green Building Standards Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24, Part 11, excluding all appendices.
- (i) The 2016 California Energy Code, Title 24, Part 6.
- (j) The Uniform Housing Code of the International Conference of Building Officials, except its definition of a substandard building.

SECTION 2. That Escondido Municipal Code Chapter 6, Article 2, Section 6-

39, is amended by replacing all references to the 2012 Edition to the Standard

Specifications for Public Works Construction (the "Green Book") with the 2015 Edition.

SECTION 3. That Escondido Municipal Code Chapter 6, Article 3, Section 6-42.1, Amendments, is repealed. SECTION 4. That Escondido Municipal Code Chapter 6, Article 6, Section 6-160, Amendments, is repealed.

SECTION 5. SEPARABILITY. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions thereof.

SECTION 6. That as of the effective date of this ordinance, all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. That the City Clerk is hereby directed to certify to the passage of this ordinance and to cause the same or a summary to be prepared in accordance with Government Code Section 36933, to be published one time within 15 days of its passage in a newspaper of general circulation, printed and published in the County and circulated in the City of Escondido.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT Major Projects Update

Commercial / Office:

- Escondido Research and Technology Center East (ERTC) (Developer: James McCann) No change from the following update reported last week: This is a 72,000 square foot medical office building proposed on the east side of Citracado Parkway across from Palomar Medical Center located at 2130 Citracado Parkway. A grading permit has been issued by the Engineering Division. Building plans have been submitted for plan check. The applicant has recently requested to install a temporary paved parking lot in this area to serve the hospital. A grading plan for the temporary parking lot was approved June 13, 2016.
- Escondido Research and Technology Center West (ERTC) (Developer: James McCann) No change from the following update reported last week: This is a 144,000 sq. ft. development involving two medical office buildings proposed on the west side of Citracado Parkway across from Palomar Medical Center located at 2097 – 2175 Citracado Parkway. A grading permit has been issued by the Engineering Division. Esgil and the Planning Division have approved the building plans. A fee deferral agreement has been signed and

the building permit was issued June 23, 2016. A tentative parcel map (TPM) for office condominiums was approved on July 12, 2016. A Final Parcel Map was submitted by the applicant on July 25, 2016, and is currently being reviewed by Planning and Engineering. A modified building plan to add a linear accelerator is now being reviewed by staff.

- 3. <u>Centerpointe 78 Commercial (Developer: Lars Andersen, Pacific Development)</u> No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a 45,650 sq. ft. supermarket and restaurant located at 925 N. Broadway. The project was approved by the City Council on December 9, 2015. Demolition of the former auto dealership has been completed down to the foundation. Grading plans have been submitted to Engineering and Planning for review. Building plans for the supermarket were submitted to the Building Division on September 14, 2016, and are being reviewed by Building and Planning staff. A boundary adjustment application to place the two buildings on separate parcels went to Planning on October 14, 2016.
- Westfield Theater (Developer: Kim Brewer, Westfield) No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a 10-auditorium movie theater totaling 57,600 sq. ft. located on the north side of the Westfield Mall. The project was approved by the City Council on November 4, 2015.
- 5. Felicita Development, LLC (Developer: Katherine Park, Creative Design Associates) No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a 140-unit hotel, and a gas station or office/residential care facility at the southeast corner of Felicita Rd. and Gamble Lane. The applicant and staff met with the architect to discuss building elevations, 5-story height limitations and site design issues given the existing wetland constraints on the property. Additional technical analysis and coordination is needed to address traffic, biology, water and sewer service, geotechnical and storm water concerns, along with a market study for the proposed uses. The applicant met with the wild life agencies and is responding to technical studies needed to complete the application.
- 6. <u>Springhill Suites (Developer: Raj Patel, San Bernardino Hospitality LLC)</u> No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a 4-story, 105-suite hotel totaling 73,300 sq. ft. located at 200 La Terraza Drive. The hotel includes a small conference room and an enlarged lobby for serving continental breakfast. A revised set of grading plans has been approved since February and grading for the hotel site has now started. Building plans have been approved by Esgil, Fire, Planning and Engineering. The building permit is ready to be issued.
- 7. Escondido Auto Park Association (Developer: Tim Brecht, Escondido Auto Park Association) – The association is proposing to upgrade the existing electronic message sign along I-15. An application for a new regional market sign and an amendment to the Sign Ordinance to increase the allowable display area for a regional market sign was submitted to the Planning Division on May 6, 2016. The proposed sign would be located in the same location as the existing sign at a slightly lower height (73.5 feet) with approximately the same overall



dimensions. The Planning Commission recommended approval of the new regional market sign and amendment to the Sign Ordinance on July 12, 2016. The City Council approved the new regional market sign and amendment to the Sign Ordinance on August 17, 2016. Building plans are currently being reviewed by staff and a building permit should be issued soon.

Industrial

- <u>StorQuest (Developer: The William Warren Group, Inc.)</u> No change from the following update reported last week: This proposed project at 220 W. Mission Avenue involves a 102,500 sq. ft., four-story self-storage facility development with three in-line shops and a small office. The Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of the proposed General Plan Amendment, Planned Development and Zone Change on August 9, 2016. The project was approved by the City Council on September 14, 2016.
- 2. <u>Victory Industrial Development (Developer: Scott Merry, Badiee Development)</u> No change from the following update reported last week: This project involves two industrial buildings totaling 91,000 sq. ft. (one building 55,500 sq. ft., second building 35,500 sq. ft.) located at 2005 Harmony Grove Road and a zone change from residential to Planned Industrial consistent with the updated General Plan. The Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of the proposed General Plan Amendment, Planned Development and Zone Change on August 9, 2016. It was approved by the City Council on September 14, 2016. Building plans were submitted into plan check the following day and are now being reviewed by staff.
- 3. Micro-Filtration Reverse Osmosis (Developer: City of Escondido Utilities Department) The proposed project involves a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for the development of a new City facility to provide advanced treatment for recycled water produced at the City of Escondido's Hale Avenue Resource Recovery Facility (HARRF) for agricultural uses with the capacity for future treatment for indirect potable reuse. The facility would be sized for a total production capacity of 2.0 million gallons per day (mgd). A previous proposal for development of the facility at 2512 East Washington Avenue has now been shelved while staff pursues development of the facility on an alternative site located on the southeastern corner of Washington Avenue and Ash Street. On July 20, 2016, the City Council approved a first-phase design contract with Black and Veatch for the design effort need to bring the new site design to the Planning Commission for CUP consideration in December 2016. If the Planning Commission approves the CUP, a contract for the remaining design work will be brought forward to the City Council. Site and building design concepts have been developed and two neighborhood meetings were held on October 12, 2016 and November 3, 2016. A 30-day public review period for the proposed Mitigated Negative Declaration started on October 27, 2016 and will end on November 27, 2016. A Planning Commission hearing on the proposed CUP tentatively has been scheduled for December 13, 2016.

- 4. <u>Wastewater Collections Yard Expansion (Developer: City of Escondido Utilities Department)</u> – The project involves development of 1.8 acres of a larger, approximately 15.4-acre site for the construction of a new wastewater collections yard and maintenance facility for the City's Hale Avenue Resource Recovery Facility (HARRF) at 1521 S. Hale Avenue. The proposed facilities will consist of three separate pre-fabricated metal buildings 3,735 sq. ft. -5,670 sq. ft. for collections; work bays and workshops for regular maintenance of vehicles and equipment. The project would require the processing of a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) and rezone. The Planning Commission held a public hearing and recommended approval on May 10, 2016. It was approved by the City Council on June 15, 2016. Grading, building and landscape plans are now being reviewed by staff for permit issuance.
- 5. Escondido Self-Storage Facility (Developer: Brandywine Homes, Inc.) No change from the following update reported last week: A modification to a Master and Precise Development Plan for revisions to the design of a previously approved, but not yet constructed, self-storage facility with direct access to Brotherton Road near the intersection with Cranston Drive. The proposed project was submitted on May 11, 2016, and proposes approximately 77,500 SF of storage area in two buildings. The larger building is two stories over a basement with all interior loading. The smaller building is one-story with some exterior roll-up doors. The project site is also part of a five-lot Tentative Map for four residential lots and one commercial lot (Tract 900) that is concurrently being processed for an extension of time. Planning staff approved the environmental technical studies needed for the update of the previous environmental review on July 12. Architecture was approved by staff Design Review on July 14 and an addendum to the previous MND has been prepared. The project was recommended for approval by the Planning Commission on September 13, 2016, and the City Council approved the project on October 12, 2016.

Institutional

- John Paul the Great Catholic University (Developer: Kevin Meziere, John Paul the Great Catholic University) – No change from the following update reported last week: A Conditional Use Permit to expand the campus and student enrollment at 155 W. Grand Avenue was approved by the Planning Commission on December 8, 2015. The proposal includes improvements to the former H. Johnson site at 131 S. Broadway for studio and classroom space, and the former bank at 200 W. Grand Avenue for administrative offices and a student resource center. The proposed expansion would also increase the student enrollment from 300 to 1,200 students over the next several years.
- Escondido United Reformed Church (Developer: Brent Cooper) No change from the following update reported last week: The project is an expansion for a phased, multi-year, master construction/development plan for a new 12,250 SF two-story sanctuary, conversion of existing buildings to a social hall, demolition of an existing social hall/classroom building (approx. 4,620 SF) and construction of approximately 5,250 SF for a nursery, multi-purpose room, classrooms for Sunday school at 1864 N. Broadway. Revised architectural plans were



unanimously approved by the Planning Commission on June 14, 2016. The grading plans are now in plan check.

3. Emmanuel Faith Community Church (Developer: Jim North, EFCC) – No change from the following update reported last week: The project is a phased, multi-year construction and renovation program for the Emmanuel Faith campus that includes demolishing the existing children's rooms and constructing a new nursery and children's building for up to 200 children, construction of a two-story training center/youth complex, renovation of the existing high school/college building, conversion of the existing education center into an office and meeting room building, demolition of the existing café and construction of a new café, demolition and construction of a new maintenance building, construction of a new gathering plaza with baptismal outdoor water feature, and reconstruction and expansion of the existing worship center from 1,600 seats to 2,000 seats. The Planning Commission approved the proposed modification to the Conditional Use Permit for the campus on June 9, 2015. Grading, building and landscape plans for the first phase (45,414 square foot new children's building) are being reviewed by staff and Esgil.

Residential

- <u>Oak Creek (Developer: Jason Han, New Urban West)</u> No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a 65-unit single family development located at the southeastern corner of Felicita Road and Hamilton Lane approved by the City Council in 2015. The LAFCO Board unanimously approved the annexation on October 5, 2015, and the annexation has been recorded. No grading or improvement plans have been submitted by the developer at this time.
- <u>Amanda Estates (Developer: Jason Han, New Urban West)</u> No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a 22-unit single family development on Amanda Lane approved by the City Council in 2015. The LAFCO Board approved the reorganization (annexation) at their meeting on August 3, 2015, and the annexation has been recorded. No grading or improvement plans have been submitted by the developer at this time.
- 3. <u>Pradera (Developer: Moses Kim, Lennar Homes)</u> No change from the following update reported last week: This project consists of a 70-unit single family development located at the northeastern corner of Ash Street and Lehner Avenue. The developer has obtained building permits for five phases involving 44 homes and those phases are under construction. Homebuyer interest in the product remains high and sales are progressing. All five final maps in the project have now recorded. Precise grading plans for all phases have now been approved.
- 4. <u>Lexington (Zenner) (Developer: Eric Johnston, KB Homes)</u> *No change from the following update reported last week*: The project is a 40-unit, single-family development at the northeastern corner of Lehner Avenue and Vista Avenue. The three model homes on the eastern side of Ash Street are now open and sales are progressing as expected. A rough

grading permit was issued for the project site on August 18, 2016 and grading is underway. The final map is scheduled for City Council approval on November 16, 2016. The precise grading plan for Phase 1 is nearing approval.

- Stella Park Condominiums (Developer: Edward Kaen, ETP, LLC) No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a 65-unit, three-story townhome Planned Development located at 2516 S. Escondido Blvd. The project includes three separate recreation areas for residents. The City Council approved the project on April 27, 2016. No grading or improvement plans have been submitted by the developer at this time.
- 6. <u>Wohlford (Developer: Jack Henthorne)</u> No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a 55-unit single family development located on Bear Valley Parkway east of Encino Drive. A Specific Alignment Plan for Bear Valley Parkway detailing the proposed roadway design is under review. The EIR consultant and staff have reviewed the applicant's technical reports and provided comments for revisions. Bi-weekly status meetings have commenced as the Draft EIR gets underway.
- Latitude II (Developer: Peter Zak, Lyon/NCA) No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a 112-unit multi-family development, located at the northeastern corner of Centre City Parkway and Washington Avenue, and approved by the City Council on August 19, 2015. A Final Subdivision Map has been submitted for review and is awaiting approval of a boundary adjustment for a property exchange with the adjacent motel owner. Grading and building plans are nearing approval.
- 8. <u>Canyon Grove Estates Tract 932 (Developer: John Vance, Shea Homes)</u> This project is a 179-lot single family residential development on the north side of Vista Avenue east of Conway Drive. The final architectural design and landscaping plans for the Precise Plan application were approved by the Planning Commission on June 14, 2016. A rough grading permit has been issued and grading is underway. The Final Map has been approved by the City Council. Precise grading plans for the model complex and a model home permit have been approved. Building plans for the construction of eight model homes were submitted on May 18, 2016 and are expected to be issued this week. The applicant is coordinating the plan review for off-site street improvements on Ash Street with the County's Department of Public Works.
- 9. <u>Safari Highlands Ranch (SHR) (Developer: Jeb Hall, Concordia Homes)</u> No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a 550-unit single family development located east of the Rancho San Pasqual community and north of the San Diego Safari Park. The project involves 1,100 acres including annexation and a Sphere of Influence update for a master planned community with parks, trails, recreation center, fire station and open space. Planning and Engineering extensions of staff have been funded by the applicant and retained to assist the City in processing the project. The City Council approved the consultant contract for preparing the EIR on March 23, 2016. The contract planner has been meeting with the consultant, Michael Baker International (MBI), and has started review of first draft



sections of the EIR. While the EIR is generally on schedule, there have been some changes to the site plan, which will affect the EIR schedule. The changes include the elimination of the "water factory" for wastewater treatment, elimination of the public park, changes to the entry road which would now be private instead of public, and relocation of the fire station to the former public park site. These changes will require the applicant's civil engineer to make a number of revisions to the tentative map, but are not anticipated to affect the proposed development envelope or the number of proposed lots. A revised tentative map depicting the site plan changes was submitted on October 17, 2016, and is being reviewed by staff and the contract planner.

- 10. <u>High Pointe Tract 693-J (Developer: Russell Schaeffer, True Life Communities</u>) No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a custom-home development with 39 estate lots accessed from Mesa Rock Road. Staff has prepared a bond and fee letter based on the proposed grading and landscape plans, and has sent it to the applicant.
- 11. <u>Del Prado (Developer: Kerry Garza, Touchstone Communities)</u> No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a 113-unit townhome-style Planned Development located at the southwestern corner of Brotherton Road and the Centre City Parkway frontage road. The project includes a recreational facility, pool, and open space areas. Staff worked through various site design and utility issues with the applicant prior to scheduling the project for a public hearing. The City Council approved the project on May 11, 2016. No grading or improvement plans have been submitted by the developer at this time.
- 12. <u>701 San Pasqual Valley Rd (Developer: Bob Stewart)</u> No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a 19-unit single family development located at 701 San Pasqual Rd/1201 E. 5th Avenue (formerly Tract 898) on 7.2 acres. The application is under review and a letter detailing additional comments and submittal requirements was forwarded to the applicant. Additional information and revised plans were submitted to the Planning Division on June 13, 2016. Planning Division has reviewed the submittal and informed the applicant that it is still incomplete.
- 13. <u>Veterans Village (Developer: Veterans Village of San Diego)</u> *No change from the following update reported last week:* This project is a mixed-use development involving a 54-unit affordable multi-family residential apartment project for military veterans and their families. It includes on-site administration office, business center, club house and other support spaces for the residents; and a small commercial component to support training opportunities offered at the facility at 1556 S. Escondido Boulevard. Building plans have been submitted for review and comment; the grading plans and landscaping plans have been approved. A demolition permit for the historic structures on-site has been issued following completion of the required mitigation and work is expected to commence soon.
- 14. <u>Escondido Gateway (Developer: Greg Waite, Integral Communities)</u> No change from the following update reported last week: This project is a mixed-use development involving 126



residential units within three, 4-5 story buildings with indoor and outdoor recreational areas and an opportunity for a small (1,000 sq. ft.) commercial/flex space on 2.6 acres (48 dwelling units/acre) located at 700 W. Grand Avenue (former Police Station) across the street from the Escondido Transit Center. Plans were submitted for the project involving a Specific Plan Amendment, Tentative Map, Planned Development and Development Agreement. On September 13, 2016, the Planning Commission recommended approval of the proposed development. The City Council approved the project on October 12, 2016.

15. The Villages at Escondido Country Club (Developer: Jason Han, New Urban West, Inc.) – The project would redevelop the former 109.3-acre Escondido Country Club golf course property with a new residential development consisting of 392 dwelling units including single-family detached and attached duplex units. The proposed project density is 3.6 dwelling units per acre with a minimum residential lot size of 2,555 square feet. The development would include 46 acres of open space including a landscaped greenbelt with a four-mile trail system linking park features. Other proposed amenities include a new clubhouse building, swimming pool, gym, tennis/pickle ball court, restaurant and bar and banquet facilities. The proposed General Plan Amendment, Specific Plan, Vesting Tentative Map and Zone Change applications and plans were submitted to the Planning Division on October 31, 2016. The plans are now being routed to City departments and agencies for comments. The developer has retained Dudek to prepare the Draft EIR for the project. The developer will fund an extension of Planning staff to assist the City in processing the project.

Building Division:

- 1. The Building Division had a very busy week issuing 90 permits for the week with a total valuation of \$1,120,191. Permits were for tenant improvements, photovoltaics, mobile home set ups and miscellaneous type.
- 2. 36 photovoltaic permits were issued for the week. The Building Division has issued 1,125 solar permits this year compared to 1,163 issued for the same time last year.
- 3. Counter techs had one of the busiest weeks on record, assisting, on average, 40 customers per day with 50 customers on Monday.
- 4. Building inspections averaged 33 inspections per day. 38 inspections were requested on Friday. There were 8 inspections held over on Friday. Our new senior building inspector, John LeVey, joined our team on 11/7/2016. John comes to us after many years with Esgil Corp as an inspector and plans examiner. John brings years of knowledge and experience to the position and we look forward to utilizing his expertise to help advance development projects.
- 5. So far this year the Building Division has processed 3,323 permits, compared to 3,154 permits last year to date. Current building valuation for all issued permits to date is \$55,158,448 compared to \$41,969,987 for last year.



- 6. 56 new single-family dwellings permits have been issued this year compared with 19 issued at the same time last year.
- 7. Projects nearing permit issuance are:
 - a. Latitude 2, 112-unit apartment building at 610-660 Centre City Pkwy.
 - b. Church of Resurrection at 1445 Conway, 18,000 sf church.
 - c. Shea Homes, 179 single-family dwellings near Lehner Ave.
 - d. Veterans Village, at 1540 S Escondido Blvd, 40,000 sf 3-story apartment building.
 - e. Springhill Suites, at 200 La Terraza, 105 unit hotel.
- 8. The construction of the City Plaza mixed-use building at 300 S. Escondido Blvd is continuing and scaffolding for the podium has been being set.
- 9. The Solutions for Change affordable housing project at 1560 S. Escondido Blvd has received foundation and masonry grout inspections.
- 10. The Meadowbrook three-story apartment building with underground garage at 2081 Garden Valley Glen has received inspections for the 2nd floor slab and the 3rd story walls are being framed.
- 11. SDG&E is completing a utilities upgrade at Greencrest Mobile Home Park at 541 W 15th and will be starting upgrades soon at Town and Country Mobile Home Park at 2280 E Valley Pkwy and Citrus Gardens, 211 S Citrus Ave.
- 12. Escondido Disposal is receiving underground inspections for their conveyer pits associated with their large expansion and remodel.
- 13. Permits were issued for a new single family dwelling at 2419 Amber Ln.
- 14. Permits were issued for the new Harbor Freight Tools at 879 N. Escondido Blvd.
- 15. In-house plan review is very busy and plans are averaging close to 30 days on the initial review and 10 to 15 days on resubmittals.
- 16. Building staff continues to review the new 2016 California Building Codes to identify major changes in anticipation of the new code adoption on 1/1/2017. Staff will be attending available training on the new codes.

Code Enforcement:

1. As of October 31, 2016, the total number of open code enforcement cases is 462 cases. During the prior week, 44 new cases were opened, and 57 cases were closed, with a backlog of an additional 12 cases not yet opened for assignment and investigation.



- 2. There were 644 illegal signs confiscated during the weekend.
- 3. Last week, the Business License Division issued 34 new licenses and received 33 new applications, in addition to 194 renewals.

PUBLIC WORKS

Kit Carson Park Clean UP

Approximately 850 people from The Rancho Bernardo Church Volunteer volunteered last Saturday at Kit Carson Park under the supervision of various city staff members. The group spread mulch, removed vegetation and trash, trimmed trees and planted 15 new trees. They also painted the amphitheater, girls' softball dugouts, concession stand, a dumpster enclosure and SDG&E boxes. The volunteers brought with them not only tools but a great sense of ownership and pride and it showed in the work they completed. Their volunteer efforts saved the City of Escondido countless man hours of work and completed many tasks that were months away from being completed.

2015/2016 Street Rehabilitation and Maintenance Project:

The contractor is continuing to concentrate his paving repair effort in the Old Escondido Historical District in preparation to the arrival of the ARAM surface contractor which is set for November 9 of this week. The prime contractor has installed temporary striping along El Norte Parkway between Ash Street to the east and Nutmeg Street to the west on Wednesday of last week. The crack fill operation is ongoing along Valley Parkway between Midway Drive and Citrus Avenue.

Rose to Foxdale Neighborhood Parking District: Bids have been solicited and a contract awarded to HI- WAY Safety of Escondido. The signage has been reviewed and approved for manufacturing at this time.

City Manager's WEEKLY UPDATE to City Council

PRIVATE DEVELOPMENT

Pradera - Lennar Communities:

The construction of the water main along Stanley Avenue is complete. Water quality testing of the new pipe line began this week. Phase 5 of the project is in framing stage at this time

Lexington Model Homes - KB Homes:

The importing of material to complete the pads associated with the project north of Lehner Avenue has been completed.

City Plaza: Escondido Boulevard @ 3rd Avenue

No changes from the following reported last week: The contractor is actively framing the second floor structure in anticipation off the next concrete pour.

Tract 932 - Canyon Grove Shea Homes Community:

The contractor is continuing the mass grading for the 179 housing units. The Ash Street/ Vista Avenue improvements, which are the jurisdiction of San Diego County, is at a standstill until elements of the dry utilizes have been relocated along Ash Street. On site activity includes the installation of base material in preparation of pavement installation for the model homes streets on Thursday November 10. The construction of the off-site water main along Century Way began this week and is scheduled for completion in three weeks.

Solutions Housing Project 1560 S. Escondido Boulevard:

The construction of the remaining water line lateral will continue this week. Testing will not begin until November 14.

Latitude II Condominiums by a Lyon Homes Partnership: Washington Avenue @ Centre City Parkway

The work for installing the new water main in Washington Avenue is continuing this week. Until the site has construction water tested and available, no grading activity can proceed on site.

Westminster Theological Seminary Graduate Student Housing: Boyle Avenue @ Bear Valley Parkway

The grading contractor has ended the import of material to the site. Mass grading should be finalized in the coming week.

FUTURE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

East Valley Pkwy/Valley Center Road Widening Project:

The City has completed all conditions of approval and received Caltrans's Authorization to Construct this project. The last environmental permit has been acquired. Staff continues working with utility providers to finalize their plans to underground existing overheard cables within the project area.



Jim Stone Pool:

This project makes needed repairs to both pools and updates pool fixtures and equipment to meet current Health Department standards. The project consultant submitted updated 100% plans on 10/20/16. Staff has reviewed updates and provided plan review comments to the project consultant to finalize project plans. Staff anticipates advertising the project for bids as soon as the contract documents are accepted.

HSIP Traffic Signals at El Norte Pkwy/Fig and E. Valley Pkwy/Date:

This project installs two high priority traffic signals, and is funded with Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) grant funds. Staff continues to work with Caltrans's for approval of our request for Authorization to Construct the project. Project plans are complete; however, Caltrans approval of the Authorization to Construct is needed before the project can be put out to bid.

POLICE

Incidents

- On 10/29/16 at about 11:51 a.m., the branch manager of the US Bank, located at 2369 E. Valley Pkwy., called police to report an attempted robbery. The manager reported a 15-year-old male had entered the bank waiving a box cutter around and yelled, "This is a stick up". The juvenile fled the scene on foot with another unknown juvenile. The juvenile was described as a Hispanic male, 15-16 years old, thin build, wearing a red hoodie and carrying a box cutter. There was no loss from the bank and the investigation is ongoing.
- On 11/1/16, fire department and police officers responded to reports of a brush fire in the creek bed east of the Canyon Crest Mobile Home Park at 2100 S Escondido Blvd. Both Escondido and County Fire Units responded. The fire was located around what appeared to be a homeless encampment in the creek bed, but no one was located or seen in the area. The fire was quickly extinguished and no injuries or property damage was reported.
- On 11/4/16 at about 2:07 p.m., officers responded to the area of 5th Ave and Spruce St to investigate reports of a domestic violence incident in progress. Callers reported seeing "A male manhandling a female." Officers arrived and were unable to locate any victim. At about 2:17 p.m., Palomar Medical Center notified the police department that a female stabbing victim had been admitted to the emergency room. Officers responded and determined the female victim was stabbed by her boyfriend during the earlier incident. The victim suffered serious, but non-life threatening injuries. Officers quickly identified the suspect and converged on his residence arresting him without incident. The suspect was booked at the Vista Detention Facility on attempted murder and domestic violence charges.



On 11/4/16 at about 7:31 p.m., officers responded to 200 E. Via Rancho Pkwy to investigate a fight. The reporting party told officers he had confronted a male whom he witnessed kicking the doors of the mall. The victim reported being battered by the suspect before fleeing in a pickup truck. The victim chased the suspect and jumped into the bed of the truck. The victim rode in the bed of the truck through the mall parking lot before deciding to jump out. The suspect stopped and fired a pistol, later determined to be a BB gun, at the victim about six times. The victim was not injured. The suspect was later identified and arrested for assault with a deadly weapon. The suspect was booked at the Vista Detention Facility.
