Comments I stand in full support of Escondido Neighbors United (ENU) and the NCG of the Sierra Club, in strong opposition to the staff recommendation to take part of Felicita Park by eminent domain. This proposed action is not in the public interest and raises many questions relevant to assumptions made by staff in recommending this action. To assume that just because an entity does not sue over a project there is de-facto concurrence is a leap ad does not hold water. Unacceptable is the assumption that the addition of two 72 inch drainage pipes is not related to an increase in drainage from the project. The truth of the matter is that this project essentially paves and hardens most of 47 acres of former farmland which once paved can never be restored to its natural state. There are many other reasons to oppose this action - too many for this commentary - but it needs to be noted that KB Homes has a history of violations and was cited with a Stop work Order by the city and a notice of Violation from the Regional Board. They know the rules, but they push the envelope by continually asking for changes and accommodations. They are not to be trusted and to support a developer who seeks to exploit a natural area for profit is totally unacceptable. The taking of Felicita Park by Eminent Domain without adequate information on negative impacts is to reward a developer who has no regard for rules that apply to this development. RE: ENU OPPOSITION to eminent domain action in favor of Oak Creek

Dear Mayor and City Council,

Escondido Neighbors United (ENU) is a neighborhood organization with a long history with Oak Creek. ENU strenuously opposes the proposed action recommended by staff to take part of Felicita Park by eminent domain.

This action is nothing short of cannibalizing a historic public park asset to enrich a private developer, and one with a poor record at that.

ENU was active throughout the environmental review process regarding Oak Creek in 2014-2015. Our priority concerns included impacts of the development on contamination related to Chatham and concerns related to stormwater and non-stormwater drainage from the project into the creek, impacting our precious Felicita Park and creek, and then into our Quiet Hills Neighborhood.

ENU has never supported the attempt by, then New Urban West, to externalize their drainage issues. Neither, as has been stated repeatedly, did the County of San Diego.

It is inaccurate to suggest, as it does in the staff report, that just because an entity does not sue over a project there is de-facto concurrence. ENU's concerns are well documented, and although ENU did not bring legal action against the project, we **never** concurred with the project or with their plan to externalize their drainage issues.

Further, it is not credible to suggest, as it does in the staff report, that the addition of two 72-inch drainage pipes is not related to increases from drainage from the project. This project essentially paves and hardens most of 47 acres of land which was originally open farmland.

Although ENU opposed the project, we offered several recommendations to reduce our issues of highest concern around creek protection and drainage. One of our primary

recommendations was that the number of homes be reduced. By reducing the amount of impervious surface and increasing the amount of area where infiltration of stormwater may occur, the volume and velocity of stormwater discharged into the creek would be reduced. This would have reduced the volume of sediment that would be discharged into the creek and reduce erosion and scouring in the creek. These requests fell on deaf ears and now the developers want to move forward with their project on the backs of our public park.

The major concerns with offsite flows are two-fold. This project and Felicita Park are located on top of the Chatham groundwater contamination plume. More scouring of the creek in the Park may lead to additional discharge of contaminants from the Chatham plume, which already 'daylight' (when the contamination is released into the air) into the Creek near the site.

Second, inadequate retention and drainage from the site will worsen sedimentation, siltation, flooding flows, and other issues that degrade the designated beneficial uses of the creek, such as Contact and Non-contact Water Recreation, Wildlife Habitat, and Warm Freshwater Habitat. This reduces the use of the creek to support wildlife, and park users and the public's enjoyment of the creek, especially in Quiet Hills.

A February 20, 2020 letter from the City of Escondido made suggestions about how to resolve issues. Rather than addressing all the issues, KB Home's response was to sue the City of Escondido and now has resulted in the proposed exercise of eminent domain. Such bad behavior should not be rewarded by the city.

KB Home also caused significant violations of the stormwater regulations and was cited with a Stop Work order by the city and a Notice of Violation from the Regional Board. KB Home is an experienced home builder and they know the rules--or should. In this case, KB Home didn't do what needed to be done until they were caught and reported to authorities. Only <u>then</u> did they take appropriate action.

Another issue that warrants your attention is the fact that KB Home, after purchasing the property and entitlements, asked for changes to accommodate its needs. The lesson here is that KB Home **can and has** changed its plans based on conditions. Now, they need to change its plan again to accommodate the drainage issues and locate a solution on-site.

It is not unreasonable to think that such an experienced company would read the relevant mitigation requirements prior to making such an investment. It is neither our problem nor the park's that they were not paying attention. **These rules and conditions were well-known in advance.** Unfortunately, we are sorry to once again see a developer seeking to exploit a natural area, in this case our park, to meet their profit margins. It is completely unacceptable.

In closing, we want to **register our strongest objection** to this eminent domain action.

Eminent domain is **not** in the public interest or a necessity for the project. It was **not** planned in the manner most compatible with the greatest public good, the impacts of this action promise to extend **far beyond** the headwall and riprap area so the action does not propose adequate real property, and there is **no** acceptable compensation for the loss of public parkland. The record does not ensure that recreational, biological, and cultural resources are protected in the historic public park. The required findings cannot be made.

We attached and incorporate our previous letters into the record.

In closing, the city should not be bailing out a moneyed interest by degrading a public asset.

RE: Opposition to Agenda #11, Urge denial action on eminent domain of land in Felicita Park for private developer economic benefits

Dear Mayor and City Council Members:

I am writing in support of Sierra Club North County Group (NCG) correspondence, to urge Escondido City Council to take action for **denial** on Agenda #11, to reject the proposal for eminent domain of land in Felicita Park for economic benefit of private developer (KB Homes/Oak Creek).

Council members are reminded how KB Homes has **not** been a good neighbor since they purchased the Oak Creek subdivision property, and failed to implement drainage mitigation measures identified in the Final EIR for Oak Creek. Additionally, their careless development violated stormwater regulations in 2019-2020 which caused significant offsite environmental damage and pollution discharges to Felicita Creek.

Despite consistent public opposition before the project was ever approved in 2015, KB Homes continued to apply adversarial tactics, by their refusal to reduce the number of homes to accomodate drainage runoff and stormwater detention, and KB Homes instead sued the City. Now it appears KB Homes now only adds more insult to injury, by this current proposal for eminent domain to reduce land in Felicita Park, a heavily used, important and popular public park located in County jurisdiction.

The neighbors, and countless users of Felicita Park are public stakeholders have already identified legitimate reasons for denial of KB Homes request for eminent domain, primarily because Felicita Park should not have to be degraded to enrich the developers (KB Homes). <u>The required findings of Public Necessity are unmet.</u> It is apparent to countless public stakeholders that there is zero 'community benefit' that will be derived, and this 'taking' of public parkland from Felicita Park is only contrived by KB Homes as a Public Necessity to benefit their private exclusive economic interest. This proposed action is contrary to the public interest, and is vigorously opposed by the public, County of San Diego (Attachment 3), and environmental organizations.

"On November 19, 2021, the County submitted a letter requesting to be heard and outlining its objections to adoption of the Resolution of Necessity. A copy of that letter is attached to this Report as Attachment "3". In the letter, the County states that it "recognizes the importance of appropriately conveying the drainage off Felicita Road and is supportive of the concept of diverting the drainage to a drainage structure in the Park. As a result, the County has never denied the request to provide an easement to either the City or the Project applicant." The County represents that its "intention has always been to work with the City and Project applicant to find a suitable agreement where the Project can proceed forward." Nonetheless, the County contends that <u>"at this time, the County does not concur</u>

with the easement description or proposed offer, as the City has not provided adequate information to allow the County to determine whether the easement area is adequate or if the increased drainage to the Park will cause harm to recreational, biological, and cultural resources." As the County letter acknowledges, the parties have been in protracted discussions since 2015. The County has continued to insist on additional analysis beyond what was done prior to approval of the Oak Creek Project and the FEIR. The County failed to challenge the FEIR and has since continued to insist on revisiting various issues, including demands for further hydrological analysis reports, that should have been resolved and/or litigated before the Oak Creek Project got under way"

The Staff Report indicates the City Council has the option of either adopting, or <u>refusing to adopt</u>, the proposed Resolution. If the Resolution is adopted, City staff and Special Counsel will proceed to initiate eminent domain proceedings, which ultimately would lead to a determination of the fair market value of the property interests proposed to be taken through court proceedings. <u>If the City Council does not</u> <u>adopt the Resolution, the City can either (i) commit to acquiring the identified Subject Property from the owner only by negotiated acquisition; (ii) decide not to implement the Project; or (iii) provide <u>alternative direction to staff.</u></u>

For reasons outlined in public hearing correspondence regarding Agenda #11, and objections by County of San Diego (Attachment 3), public stakeholders seek action by Escondido City Council to <u>refuse to</u> <u>adopt proposed Resolution, and instead deploy other options, either (i), (ii), or (iii), as outlined by City Attorney, on page 7 of Staff Report.</u>

It is unjust, inequitable, and unconscionable. Please do not reward this kind of behavior on the part of KB Home. This is not the precedent you should set for our city. It is not the kind of precedent that serves the public.

Please vote no on eminent domain for KB Home and Oak Creek.

RE: Sierra Club NCG opposition to #11 action on eminent domain of land in Felicita Park for private developer economic benefits

Dear Mayor and City Council Members:

Sierra Club North County Group (NCG) strongly opposes eminent domain to extract land from a public County Park to enrich a private developer. The findings required for this action simply cannot be made by the city. The city cannot find that this action is in the public interest, is planned or located for the greatest public good, proposes (or even knows) an adequate area of impact or real property or provided just compensation. The taking of public property without adequate information on negative impacts to public resources for the benefit of a developer is not in the public interest. Because this impacts to the park and downstream residents and uses are unknown and unprotected, this taking cannot be justified.

The drainage issue has been well-known to the developer, local residents, and the city. The developer, KB Home Coastal (KB Home), now infamous for its flagrant disregard for rules that apply to this development, namely the mitigations required in the FEIR (of which they were fully aware when they purchased the property) and stormwater regulations which they significantly violated in 2019-2020.

The downstream neighbors, Escondido Neighbors United, and the County have been consistent in their positions since the project was proposed. There is inadequate information in the record to assure that water quality, designated and protected beneficial uses, and cultural assets will not be degraded. **Felicita Park should not have to be degraded to enrich the developers.** There are multiple things KB Homes could do on-site to address the drainage issues. They just refuse to do them.

Please understand, Felicita Park is not just any park. It has been a gathering place for people for centuries and its rich Native American and pioneer history have landed this park on the National Register of Historic Places. It was the site of a large Kumeyaay Indian village. It a jewel precious to the region and especially to park-users. It deserves better treatment than this.

Suggestions on how on-site accommodation of water retention were made by ENU and others such as to reduce the number of home sites to accommodate adequate runoff and detention. The claim that this taking has nothing to do with the drainage from the project is laughable.

However, KB Home refused to re-design the project and, instead, sued the city. The city, in turn, appears to now be attempting to bail KB Home out at the expense of a heavily used, historic public park.

It is unjust, inequitable, and unconscionable. Please do not reward this kind of behavior on the part of KB Home. This is not the precedent you should set for our city. It is not the kind of precedent that serves the public.

We also endorse comments made by the local community group most impacted, Escondido Neighbors United, and by the County on this action as well.

Please vote no on eminent domain in Felicita Park for KB Home and Oak Creek.
