In 2022, the City of Escondido spent more than 49 million dollars on police. 2.05 million dollars was supposed to be used to address homelessness, but instead 68% of it was handed over to EPD and the rest was squandered on building and maintaining hostile architecture. This is an absolutely disgraceful waste of taxpayer money and unfortunately this kind of waste is all too commonplace in this country; some cities like New York and LA have higher police budgets than the militaries of entire countries. Police do not do anything to help the unhoused, all they do is harass them. Police do not prevent crime, they just show up after the fact. 2/15/23. Esco Public Comment: Agenda Item #12. Add more diverse community-based organizations:

As a former care companion and community health worker, I believe these funding proposals need a lot of work.

The city must include more community-based organizations (CBOs) for homeless services contracts in regards to the categories of "prevention" and "outreach." There should especially be an increase in funding towards organizations who specialize in behavioral health. Moreover, there must be investment towards recruiting and retaining local multilingual, diverse, and culturally responsive community health workers.

As trusted community health and resource organizations, I believe local organizations like <u>Neighborhood</u> <u>Healthcare (Escondido)</u> and <u>Palomar Family YMCA</u> should be included in addition to discussions as potential city contract partners for homeless services prevention and outreach. Retention of local and culturally inclusive health-workers is vital for addressing our homeless residents' needs. There must be more investment in collaborating with more options for diverse youth intervention programs.

Please think outside the box and additionally include more diverse organizations. While I acknowledge that the organizations listed in the current staff report are providing resources, there is still very little working capacity. We need more bodies. We not only need more community health workers, we need these workers set-up for success to avoid burnout. Throwing the same groups, the same money, who use the same methods of outreach, won't change the outcomes or solve this housing crisis.

Hello council members and Mayor White,

As we get closer to budget season, I hope that you will consider allocating funds for serving our unhoused neighbors to community stakeholder groups. For example, Neighborhood Healthcare could help with behavioral health. Interfaith does great work, but I think it would be helpful for our community's most prominent low income clinic to be involved.

However, I think the council should also be doing more to prevent homelessness, through methods like rent control, greater publicization of rental assistance programs, and approving higher density developments with low-income provisions. Throughout the county, the rate of people falling into homelessness is greater than the rate of unsheltered people becoming housed. Many of these people are homeless for the first time, with their wages not keeping up with skyrocketing rents, or becoming disabled by cancer, COVID-19, and other illnesses.

Blackstone Capital purchased apartment complexes in Escondido, and warned Councilmember Martinez that they will soon be processing evictions. The problem is only going to get worse, and we must do better.
