RECOMMENDATION:

It is requested that Council adopt Resolution No. 2011-68 authorizing the RTCIP Traffic Impact Fee be increased from \$2.081 to \$2.123 beginning July 1, 2011.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

Participation in SANDAG's RTCIP Program is a prerequisite to the City's continued collection of Transnet funding. The City's share of Transnet funding for FY 2011/2012 will be \$2,764,000.

PREVIOUS ACTION:

On June 9, 2010, Resolution 2010-92R was approved by City Council increasing the RTCIP Fee from \$2,040 to \$2,081.

BACKGROUND:

The Transnet Extension Ordinance, approved by voters in November 2004, requires that the RTCIP Traffic Impact Fee charged by local jurisdictions be adjusted every year on July 1st in order to maintain the purchasing power of the program for improvements to the Regional Arterial System. On February 25, 2011, the SANDAG Board of Directors approved a 2 percent adjustment to the RTCIP, raising the minimum fee from \$2,081 to \$2,123 beginning July 1, 2011.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ESCONDIDO, CALIFORNIA, AUTHORIZING AN ADJUSTMENT OF THE REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION CONGESTION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (RTCIP) FEE FOR FISCAL YEAR 2001/2012

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Transnet Extension Ordinance, the City of Escondido City Council adopted Resolution 2008-10 to establish a traffic impact fee schedule and approve the City of Escondido's participation in the RTCIP program; and

WHEREAS, City Council adopted the original RTCIP fee of \$2,000 per new residential unit effective July 1, 2008; and

WHEREAS, the Transnet Extension Ordinance states the fee amount per residential unit shall be adjusted annually on July 1 of each year beginning July 1, 2009, based on the Engineering Construction Cost Index as published by the Engineering News Record or similar cost of construction index; and

WHEREAS, any increase shall not be less than 2% per year; and

WHEREAS, the FY 2010/2011 RTCIP fee was increased 2% and set at \$2,081 per residential dwelling unit per Resolution 2010-92R; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Transnet Extension Ordinance, the RTCIP fee for FY 2011/2012 must increase a minimum of 2% for a new RTCIP fee of \$2,123 per residential dwelling unit.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Escondido. California, as follows:

- 1. That the above recitations are true.
- 2. That the City Council adopts a \$2,123 Regional Transportation Congestion Improvement Program Fee per new residential dwelling unit effective July 1, 2011.
- 3. The \$2,123 Regional Transportation Congestion Improvement Program

 Fee per new residential dwelling unit is to be placed into a separate interest bearing

 RTCIP account.

SUBJECT: Short-form Rent Increase Application for Valley Parkway Mobilehome Park

RECOMMENDATION:

- Consider the short-form rent increase application submitted by Valley Parkway Mobilehome Park.
- If approved, adopt Rent Review Board Resolution No. 2011-04 granting an increase of seventy-five percent (75%) of the change in the Consumer Price Index, or 1.393% (an average of \$5.62) for the period of December 31, 2008 to December 31, 2010.

INTRODUCTION:

Valley Parkway Mobilehome Park ("Park") has filed a short-form rent increase application. The Board is asked to accept the staff report, hear public testimony, and make a determination concerning the request in accordance with the Escondido Rent Protection Ordinance and the short-form procedures as outlined in the Rent Review Board Guidelines. The application and the staff report have been made available to the Board for review and consideration prior to the hearing.

THE RENT INCREASE APPLICATION:

Valley Parkway Mobilehome Park is an all age Park located at 1721 East Valley Parkway. Valley Parkway has a total of 144 spaces, of which 139 spaces are subject to rent control. Residents that moved into the Park within the last 12 months (which currently represents 10 spaces) will receive a zero increase. The application is requesting an increase for 129 spaces. The Park's facilities include a clubhouse with a kitchen and billiard room. The Park also has a pool and patio area. There are laundry facilities available for a fee.

The application meets all the eligibility criteria for submittal of a short-form rent increase application.

PARK OWNER'S REQUEST:

The period of consideration for this rent increase request is December 31, 2008 to December 31, 2010. Seventy-five percent of the change in the Consumer Price Index for this two-year period is 1.393%. Based on an average monthly space rent of approximately \$404.06, the average increase would be approximately \$5.62.

The last rent increase application for Valley Parkway was a short form request approved in March of 2007, in the amount of 2.89% or an average increase of \$10.66 per space per month.

RESIDENT MEETING AND COMMENTS:

Residents were invited to a meeting in their clubhouse on May 18, 2011, at 6:00 p.m. The meeting was attended by three residents, the Park Managers, Anita and Ray Henbest, Code Enforcement Officer Sandra Moore, and consultant Michelle Henderson. Iris Hendershot volunteered to serve as the resident representative for this process. Residents were advised of their right to speak at the public hearing and that they must sign in if they are protesting the application. There were no health and safety issues expressed by the residents or concerns regarding the short-form rent increase application.

Currently, there are a total of 24 residents who participate in the City of Escondido Rent Subsidy Program.

CODE INSPECTION REPORT:

An inspection by the Code Enforcement Division of the City noted violations of the Health and Safety Code. A copy the Code Report is attached as "Exhibit A". The applicant representative received a copy of the Report and is aware that no rent increase, if granted, may be implemented until the Health and Safety Code violations have been cleared.

ADDITIONAL FACTORS AFFECTING THE APPLICATION:

The decision of the Rent Review Board will be finalized by adoption of the Resolution confirming the findings of the Public Hearing. The Notice of Determination will be mailed to the applicant and residents immediately upon adoption of the Resolution. The Park owner may send the 90-day notice of any rent increase granted to the residents upon the adoption of the Resolution.

WHEREAS, Article V of Chapter 29 of the Escondido Municipal Code is a codification of the Escondido Mobilehome Rent Protection Ordinance ("Ordinance") and provides for mobilehome space rent regulation; and

WHEREAS, the City of Escondido Mobilehome Park Rental Review Board ("Board") is charged with the responsibility of considering applications for rent increases; and

WHEREAS, a short-form rent increase application pursuant to Section 12 of the Rent Review Board Guidelines was filed on April 11, 2011, by Delmy V. Solano of Les Frame Management, Inc., the representative of the owner of the rental spaces in Valley Parkway Mobilehome Park, located at 1721 East Valley Parkway in Escondido; and

WHEREAS, this is the tenth rent increase application filed by the Park since the Ordinance became effective in 1988. The last rent increase was granted by the board in Rent Review Board Resolution 2007-01 on March 7, 2007, for 2.89%, or approximately \$10.66 per space, per month; and

WHEREAS, at the time of the current application, the average monthly space rent was \$404.06 for the 129 spaces subject to a rent increase. The owner requested a rent increase in the amount of seventy-five (75%) of the change in the Consumer Price

Index (CPI) for the period December 31, 2008, through December 31, 2010, in accordance with the Rent Review Board short-form policy guidelines. The application estimated this amount to be an average of \$5.62 (1.393%) per space, per month; and

WHEREAS, a notice of the Park's Rent Increase Application was sent to all affected homeowners. All parties were given notice of the time, date, and place of the rent hearing before the Board; and

WHEREAS, on May 19, 2011, a Mobilehome Park Rent Review Code Enforcement Inspection Report ("Inspection Report") was completed. It noted Health and Safety Code violations in the Park; and

WHEREAS, on June 15, 2011, the Board held its public hearing. After an initial presentation of the Staff Report, the Board invited testimony from Park ownership, residents of the Park and other residents of the community at large; and

WHEREAS, after all present had been given an opportunity to speak, the hearing was closed. Following an opportunity for discussion among the Board members and clarifying questions to the parties and Staff, the Board voted to grant an increase of 1.393% (75% of the change in the CPI for the two-year period of consideration) or average rent increase of \$5.62 per space, per month, for the 129 spaces which are subject to the rent increase.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Rent Review Board of the City of Escondido, as follows:

1. That the above recitations are true.

- 2. That the Board has heard and considered all of the reports and testimony presented, and has considered the facts as outlined in the short-form Guidelines ("Guidelines").
- 3. That following the Guidelines, an increase based on seventy-five percent (75%) of the change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for San Diego County from December 31, 2008, through December 31, 2010, would amount to 1.393%, which averages \$5.62 per space, per month, for the 129 spaces that are subject to a rent increase.
- 4. That the Board concluded that an increase of 1.393%, an average of \$5.62 per space, per month, is consistent with the Guidelines and is fair, just, and a reasonable increase in light of the information presented by all parties.
- 5. That the increase may be implemented upon the expiration of the required 90-day notice to the residents, which may be issued upon the adoption of this Resolution.
- 6. That the increase may not be implemented until after the health and safety code violations noted in the Inspection Report have been corrected, signed off, and are in compliance with the various state and local code sections as noted in the Inspection.

- 2) Adopt Resolution No. 2011-73 approving the Transnet Five-Year Local Street Improvement Program of Projects for Fiscal Years 2011/12 - 2015/16.

FIVE-YEAR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM AND FY 2011/12 CIP BUDGET

BACKGROUND:

The CIP is a five-year planning tool which is developed and updated annually. However, due to the current financial climate, management's main focus is identifying dependable funding resources for fiscal year 2011/12 and the corresponding uses of those funds. A summary of capital project requests was prepared and submitted to the department heads and city manager for review and discussion on April 5, 2011.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

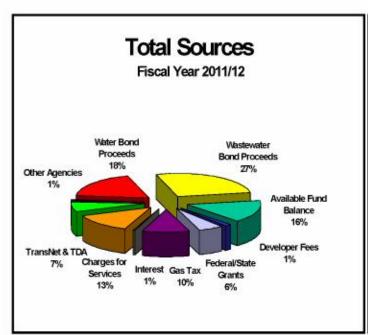
The Five-Year Capital Improvement Program (CIP or Program) summarizes anticipated resources and their estimated uses. In order to maintain the City's high quality-of-life standards and to affirm Escondido as the "City of Choice," the CIP budget has programed major infrastructure, capital construction, improvements, and other maintenance projects.

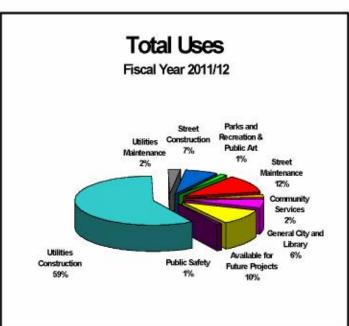
The total proposed budget estimates source revenues for FY 11/12 is \$39.2 million, which is available to fund capital improvements and other maintenance capital expenditures. Approximately \$6.2 million comes from existing available funds. The current year budget anticipates uses of approximately \$35.2 million in appropriated expenditures, transfers and designations.

Upon completion of a project, any remaining balance is returned to its corresponding fund's reserves, which becomes available to fund future projects. This program includes approximately \$3.9 million in reserves available for future projects. The majority of the reserves are restricted funding only to be used for specific purposes such as \$1.7 million for public facilities and \$1.6 million restricted for street related expenditures.

The following information highlights the major categories of the funding (Sources and Uses) contained in the Five-Year Capital Improvement Program for fiscal year 2011/12.

Each year, the City updates the Five-year Street Capital Improvement Program. In the past, the five-year plan was developed with the assistance and oversight of the Traffic and Transportation Task Force. This year, the Street CIP Program was developed through the budget process, managed by the Finance Department and assisted by senior department staff members. The Task Force was not formed this year, primarily due to past commitments to several large and costly street projects that require additional funding for completion. Some of these commitments arose from development agreements or by federal funding secured through lobbying efforts. Examples of these major projects are:

- Citracado Parkway, I-15 to West Valley Parkway
- Citracado Parkway, West Valley Parkway to Harmony Grove Road
- East Valley Parkway & Valley Center Road
- Maple Street Pedestrian Plaza
- State Route 78 Bridge Replacement at Nordahl
- Valley & Maple and Valley & Second Traffic Signals
- Valley Boulevard Relocation

From this group of major projects, the SR 78 Bridge Replacement and the Valley Boulevard Relocation are believed to be fully funded. Depending on final bidding, even these two projects may need some supplementary funding. The rest of the projects listed will almost certainly need supplementary funds for construction.

All of these costly projects are progressing simultaneously with slightly different timelines. To manage the uncertain timelines, significant amounts of resources over the five-year period have not been programmed. These unprogrammed funds will be authorized as they are needed as the various projects work their way through the environmental review, planning, and design process. As they move to the construction phase, the unprogrammed resources will be allocated through future Council action on each individual project. If it turns out that our needs exceed our funding capabilities, it may be necessary to borrow against future Transnet funds. Many agencies in the San Diego region have used this loan process made available through SANDAG to deliver major projects in a timely manner.

The amount of unprogrammed resources that will remain available for these projects total \$9,797,590. The unprogrammed amounts by fiscal year over the five-year planning period are shown in the table below-

The value of the Task Force's participation in the street CIP planning process was also impacted by the large transfer of gas tax funds to the general fund to offset Maintenance Division costs. In addition, there is a large amount of Transnet funds allocated to our annual street maintenance program. As a result, there was very little remaining in available street funds that the Task Force could use to consider new projects of any real significance.

ANNUAL OPERATING AND MAINTENANCE PROGRAMS:

There are also a number of ongoing annual operating and maintenance programs funded through the Five-year Street CIP budget. These programs, which continue from year to year, are:

- Neighborhood Projects
- School Safety Committee
- Storm Drain Infrastructure
- Street Maintenance
- Traffic Signals and Intersections
- Traffic Signal Infrastructure

The Street Maintenance account will continue to receive 30% of the annual Transnet allocation received each year (which is the maximum percentage allowed by the Transnet ordinance), as well as an increased amount of gas tax funds from a Proposition 42/gas tax swap enacted by the California State Legislature last year. The remaining annual programs are funded at levels that are fairly consistent with prior years.

TRANSNET PROGRAM OF PROJECTS:

As of July 1, 2008, new Transnet funds that accrue to the City are being collected through the Transnet Extension Ordinance approved by San Diego area voters in November of 2004. The extended ordinance is considerably more complex than the original Transnet measure. Among the new procedures is a requirement to be clear with regard to programming of the new Transnet funds and to be transparent to the public so any interested party can comment on the use of these funds.

Two projects are being programmed with Transnet funds from FY 2011/2012; these are: Street Maintenance, in the amount of \$796,000, and Valley Boulevard Relocation, in the amount of \$1,668,000. Transnet funding in these amounts for these two projects constitutes the City of Escondido's Transnet Local Street Improvement Program of Projects for Fiscal Years 2012 through 2016 as presented for Council approval in the attached implementing Resolution No. 2011-73. The unprogrammed Transnet funds totaling \$7,534,775 for the five-year planning period, as noted in the table above, will be acted on separately by City Council through future authorizing resolutions. The funding for the Street Maintenance and Valley Boulevard Relocation projects have been inputted into ProjecTrak, SANDAG's automated system for programming of regional highway and street

ProjecTrak system will be needed as the remaining Transnet funds are allocated by City Council to individual projects. Amendments to the Program of Projects in the ProjecTrak system are permitted by SANDAG quarterly.

Such appropriations as adjusted shall be neither increased nor decreased without approval of the City Council, except for transfers within funds allowed under the City of Escondido's adopted budget adjustment policy. All amounts designated in each project budget on file with the City Clerk are hereby appropriated for such uses to the fund under which they are listed, and shall be neither increased nor decreased without approval of the City Manager.

SECTION 3. Any Council action changing the above mentioned assumptions will cause the Five-Year Capital Improvement Program and FY 2011/12 Project Budgets to be revised and brought back to the City Council for modification.

RESOLUTION NO. 2011-73

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ESCONDIDO, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING THE TRANSNET LOCAL STREET IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM OF PROJECTS FOR FISCAL YEARS 2012 THROUGH 2016

WHEREAS, on November 4, 2004, the voters of San Diego County approved the San Diego Transportation Improvement Program Ordinance and Expenditure Plan (*TransNet* Extension Ordinance); and

WHEREAS, the *TransNet* Extension Ordinance provides that SANDAG, acting as the Regional Transportation Commission, shall approve a multi-year program of projects submitted by local jurisdictions identifying those transportation projects eligible to use transportation sales tax (*TransNet*) funds; and

WHEREAS, the City of Escondido ("City") was provided with an estimate of annual *TransNet* local street improvement revenues for fiscal years 2012 through 2016; and

WHEREAS, the City has held a clearly noticed public hearing regarding its proposed list of projects prior to approval by its authorized legislative body in accordance with Section 5(A) of the *TransNet* Extension Ordinance and Rule 7 of SANDAG Board Policy 31.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Escondido, California, as follows:

- 1. That the above recitations are true.
- 2. That pursuant to Section 2(C)(1) of the *TransNet* Extension Ordinance,

the City certifies that no more than 30 percent of its annual revenues shall be spent on maintenance-related projects.

- 3. That pursuant to Section 4(E)(3) of the *TransNet* Extension Ordinance, the City certifies that all new projects, or major reconstruction projects, funded by *TransNet* revenues shall accommodate travel by pedestrians and bicyclists, and that any exception to this requirement permitted under the Ordinance and proposed shall be clearly noticed as part of the City of Escondido's public hearing process.
- 4. That pursuant to Section 8 of the *TransNet* Extension Ordinance, the City certifies that the required minimum annual level of local discretionary funds to be expended for street and road purposes will be met throughout the five-year period consistent with the most recent Maintenance of Effort Requirements adopted by the SANDAG.
- 5. That pursuant to Section 9(A) of the *TransNet* Extension Ordinance, the City certifies that they will extract \$2,123 from the private sector for each newly constructed residential housing unit in that jurisdiction to comply with the provisions of the Regional Transportation Congestion Improvement Program (RTCIP).
- 6. That pursuant to Section 13 of the *TransNet* Extension Ordinance, the City certifies that it has established a separate Transportation Improvement Account for *TransNet* revenues with interest earned expended only for those purposes for which the funds were allocated.
- 7. That pursuant to Section 18 of the *TransNet* Extension Ordinance, the City certifies that each project of \$250,000 or more will be clearly designated during construction with *TransNet* project funding identification signs.

- 8. That the City does hereby certify that all other applicable provisions of the *TransNet* Extension Ordinance and SANDAG Board Policy 31 have been met.
- 9. That the City agrees to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend SANDAG, the San Diego County Regional Transportation Commission, and all officers and employees thereof against all causes of action or claims related to local *TransNet* funded projects.
- 10. That the City's Five-year Transnet Local Street Improvement Program of Projects for Fiscal Years 2012 through 2016, as presented to City Council in the staff report considered at the public hearing conducted at the regular City Council meeting, at which time the City Council approved the Fiscal Years 2011/2012 through 2015/2016 Five-year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) and the Fiscal Year 2011/2012 Project CIP Budgets, is hereby approved.
